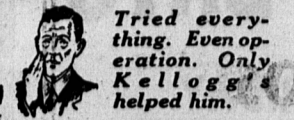
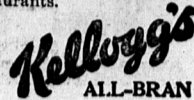

Antidumping Law Against Subsidy On Coal Rates

WINNIPEG, Nov. 5.—Enactment and enforcement of an anti-dumping law against foreign coal subsidy on coal rates if no other freight is found, and withdrawal from entry and pooling of all crown coal lands under commission to prevent exploitation and wasteful opening up of mines were among remedies urged at the convention of the Canadian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy here today.

Vote For Abolition Of Proportional Representation

W., Nov. 5.—By a vote of forty-six to twenty-four the Legislative Assembly of New South Wales today gave second reading to a bill for abolition of proportional representation, and providing for reversion to the old system of single seats on "first past the post" principle.

Potato Market Now Stationary

(Canadian Press.) VANCOUVER, B. C., Nov. 5.—Eastern dispatches report shortage of potatoes in Ontario and Maritime Provinces markets, attributed largely to demand for Canadian potatoes in the United States. A flurry which prevailed on the local market recently is now said to be over. American brokers stopped bidding for British Columbia potatoes when the price rose so that competition in the Pacific Coast states could not be met, and with this demand cut off and farmers offering their crops which they previously had withheld, prices are now more or less stationary at from \$2.75 a bag for the coast product, to \$3.00 for that of the interior of the province.

Greenwich Village Girl Stole Forty Autos In 40 Days

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—"Jackie" Rogers' motto, "A Ford a day keeps the bootleggers coming," went into limbo this morning.

"Jackie," known to her parents as Jacqueline and to her chums in Greenwich Village as the "Princess of Wales," because of the resemblance of the cut of her clothing to that affected by His Royal Highness, is in jail. She was arrested at dawn this morning in front of her apartment at 18 Barrow street as she returned home in a taxi cab, and was charged with stealing forty automobiles in forty days from owners in New Jersey, Brooklyn and Long Island.

When Detective Bushy of the Grand avenue station, Brooklyn and Police Chief Claren of Montclair, N. J., told her she was under arrest she pouted two heavily camouflaged lips and asked permission to change her appearance.

They permitted her to fetch a fur coat from her wardrobe to cover the plaid suit with the aut fashion to resemble trousers, but the collar of the wrap did not hide the flowing red Windsor tie that kept her stiff linen collar high under her chin.

Her arrest was made on information supplied by Edward Kenyon, who lived in the same apartment house, after he was caught collecting the payment for a car stolen in Montclair.

Kenyon pleaded that he was compelled at the point of a gun by the girl to join in her escapades.

Told that Kenyon had confessed to stealing two cars, she informed Detective Bushy with evident disgust:

"All that Kenyon ever did in these jobs was to keep a record of how many cars I took and to sell them somewhere in Jamaica."

She was held without bail in Flatbush court for rearrangement on Monday.

Kenyon was arrested on October 23 in the Kland automobile service garage at Van Ness and Atlantic avenues, Brooklyn, to which he had sold a Ford for \$200. The garage men were suspicious of the bill of sale he produced to show his ownership, paid him \$100, told him to return that evening and notified the police. He was taken into custody when he returned for the other \$100.

After she was taken to Brooklyn headquarters, Mrs. Rogers told how she made her thefts. Every day, she said, she and Kenyon went walking in some Jersey town or in Brooklyn, or a village on Long Island, and picked out a car. From a brief case in which she carried 200 ignition keys, she would produce one to get the engine started. Off she would drive, leaving Kenyon to trolley back home, get the car and sell it.

The bag was found in her apartment. On the inside cover stamped in gold was: "If by chance I lose

this bag, and if by chance you find it, remember my first name is Jackie and Rogers follows behind it."

Also in her apartment was found a pile of stationery of the "Speedway Automobile Sales Company," of Washington, D. C., a non-existent concern, whose name she used for her bills of sale.

The Jersey authorities will seek to extradite her.

Memorial To Fallen Heroes

LONDON, Eng., Nov. 5.—Sixty thousand men who laid down their lives in the Ypres salient, and whose resting-place it has been impossible to trace, will be commemorated in the Monin Gate, which is now in course of erection. The names of all those fallen who are buried in these unknown graves will be engraved upon the memorial.

Designed by Sir Reginald Bloomfield the arch will form part of the old ramparts of the town, adjoining the Monin Road, and will thus bridge the very roadway along which those sixty thousand men passed into battle. The arch will be surmounted at one end by a lion looking in the direction whence came the invading foe, and immediately below will be inscription:

"To the Armies of the British Empire who stood here from 1914-1918, and to those of their dead who have no known grave."

In a similar position at the other end of the arch, beneath a sarcophagus will be the further inscription: "Here are recorded the names of officers and men who fell in the Ypres salient, but to whom the fortune of war denied the known and honoured burial given to their comrades in death."

The arch is expected to be completed in about a year. Sixty thousand does not nearly exhaust the long list of those who were reported missing in the sector, but it was all that could be accomplished on one memorial; so another memorial is being erected in the cemetery at Tyne Cot, near Passchendaele, on which the remainder of the names will be inscribed.

Moderate Labor Members Make Gains

(Canadian Press.) GLASGOW, Nov. 5.—Complete returns from Scottish municipal polls show that while elections yesterday resulted in comparatively little change in parties as a whole, success of moderate members of Labor party as against Labor extremists was a feature of the voting.

RECORD TRIP OF OIL ELECTRIC CAR

(Special to The Guardian.) VANCOUVER, B. C., Nov. 5.—All records for transcontinental travel were broken this morning when the new Canadian National Railway oil electric car No. 15820 arrived in Vancouver after making the trip from Montreal in three days. The trip was not only a record-breaker so far as actual schedule was concerned, but it wrote a new chapter in the railway history of the world as marking the longest non-stop run ever made by an engine for during the 2937 miles covered the car engine not once did stop running. There is also the actual running time which again provides an unequalled passage in Dominion transportation annals. For eliminating detentions due to meeting trains and other delays incidental to modern transportation methods which came to 300 minutes the actual running time, was slightly under 67 hours.

From the first to the last the trip demonstrated the superiority of the new oil electric car. Arranged primarily as an endurance test for the engine not only did it prove this point but also it showed the speed possibilities of the new electric car. The trip was made in less than the same number of minutes, and one of the steepest grades in the Rocky Mountains was climbed at an average speed of 40 miles per hour, the average speed for the entire trip was slightly under 45 1/2 miles per hour.

Officials of the Canadian National Railways who accompanied the car on its transcontinental trip expressed themselves as being thoroughly satisfied with its performance and in their opinion it is within the realms of possibility that this journey may mark the opening of an area which by the forerunner of a new epoch in motive power as applies to steam, the oil electric car is in its infancy. They point out just as the steam locomotive was in its infancy a century ago. With its wider application and further development they believe it may develop along similar broad channels, and this may bring about the passing of the steam locomotive and prove as important as an adjunct to the future of industry and society as the conversion of the old wood-burning engines to coal. The new oil electric car which made its initial trip across Canada has a body with an overall length of 116 feet and is set on two four-wheel trucks. It is built to carry passengers, express coaches, and baggage. It will seat 75 passengers of which accommodation for 18 is in the baggage compartment situated at one end of the car. The engine is oil-burning and operates an electric generator which provides the actual power to move the car and the principle although a simple one, is entirely a new departure so far as rail transportation is concerned. A car similar to this one has been in operation about a month between Hamilton and Guelph, Ont., and has given an excellent service. The new car will go into regular service in British Columbia.
