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Grim Discovery Made On Utah Mountain Ridge

ALPINE, Utah, June 6—(AP)—A once mighty airliner lost nearly six months was found today, so battered and torn that the largest piece above the snow where it crashed was no bigger than a wash tub. The bodies of its five men and two women occupants must be dug from drifts 25 to 50 feet deep.

Bodies Of Seven Victims Believed Buried In Snow-drifts. Plane Complete Wreck.

The discovery was made on Lake Hardy Ridge, five miles up a tortuous mountain trail from this village in the Wasatch Mountains 25 miles southeast of Salt Lake City. The Ridge is 35 miles east of the regular airliner course. The craft was lost in rain and fog.
