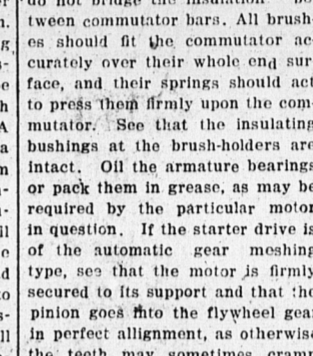
HINTS FOR The Motorist

GIVING THE STARTER "THE ONCE OVER"

See that the cable connections to the battery are free from corrosion. If they show a great incrustation scrape this off thoroughly, brighten the contact surfaces, neutralize any acid upon them with ammonia water, clamp the connections securely and coat the parts with vaseline. Be sure that the ground connection, from one side of the battery to the car frame is perfectly tight and clean. Examine the cable connections to the starter-switch terminals, to see that they are firmly secured, and if the switch contacts themselves are accessible, clean them if they require it. The switch-plunger spring should return the plunger positively. Examine the motor commutator and smooth it with No. 00 sandpaper (not emery cloth), if it is rough and blackened, blowing out any carbon or metal dust from the motor with an air blast and taking care that copper particles do not bridge the insulation between commutator bars. All brushes should fit the commutator accurately over their whole end surface, and their springs should act to press them firmly upon the commutator. See that the insulating bushings at the brush-holders are intact. Oil the armature bearings or pack them in grease, as may be required by the particular motor in question. If the starter drive is of the automatic gear meshing type, see that the motor is firmly secured to its support and that the pinion goes into the flywheel gear in perfect alignment, as otherwise the teeth may sometimes cramp and the gears fail to disengage. If the parts are accessible, the pinion can be moved to the engaging position by hand. Occasional it is necessary to disassemble a starter drive of this kind, clean the inside of the threaded sleeve and polish the armature spindle with emery cloth, as rust may form between these parts. At the same time the clamp which secures the coiled spring should be tested for tightness and the threads on which the pinion runs should be cleaned of grease by means of kerosene. In the case of starters with chain drive, the alignment of the sprockets and the tension of the chain should be inspected and the over-running clutch should be insured of lubrication. With a full charged battery, with good connections, a noticeable reduction in cranking speed and increased dimming of the lights, at starting, usually indicates that the battery is losing its capacity and will have to be replaced in the not distant future.
