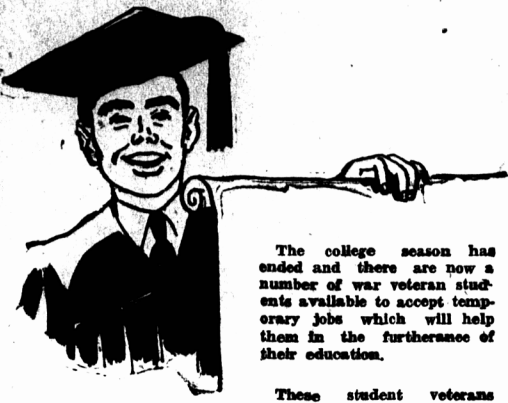


OUR STUDENT VETERANS

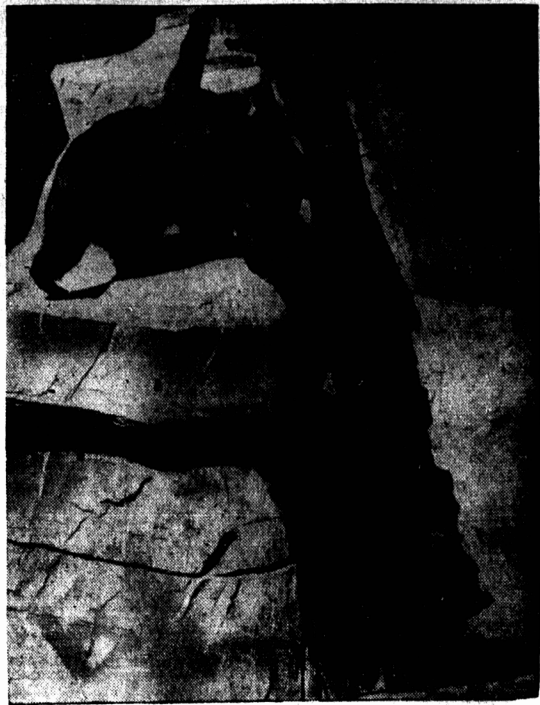

WHAT IS HOME WITHOUT A GARDEN?



Soil in the Drill, and After Sowing Shade the Row With Boards Until the Seeds Germinate.

LONDON, May 18 — Spinners from many parts of Britain, who presented a petition Sunday to Prime Minister Attlee for pensions at the age of 50, appeared yesterday in the lobby of the House of Commons to back up their appeal. Representatives of the National Spinners' Pensions Association interviewed several members of parliament in search of support.

FIRST PUPPETRY

Both China and India are credited with the origin of puppet shows. Sweet peas, lupins and garden peas usually grow better if the seed are treated with one of the inoculants available for the purpose. Treatment stimulates the ability of the plants to obtain nitrogen from the air, where other plants must get it from the soil.

Flowers which do not like to be transplanted include annual, poppies, salpiglossis, nigella, annual phlox. If necessary to transplant them the seedlings should be grown in small pots so they can be moved without disturbing their roots.

MOTHER'S DAY: ST. MARY'S CONVENT, SOURIS

"Mother's Day, 1946, will long remain a pleasant memory to the mothers of the pupils of St. Mary's Convent, Souris, who filled the Assembly Hall of the school, at 2:30 p.m., May 13th. The opening words of greeting read by Miss Inez McPhee, to welcome all to the choice programme presented by the children of the elementary grades, each group seemed to vie with companions in expressing its tribute of the mother's wisdom and gratitude to "Mother"—the one word whose wealth of meaning can never be exhausted.

When the mulberry leaves come out and the seed-pearl eggs of the silk moth hatch, old women wise in the ancient craft and their granddaughters new to it, still minister to the insatiable hunger of the tiny worms. In the roasting sheds, in the feeding trays, their myriad munching mandibles are faintly audible as they attack the mulberry leaves.

Out of this emerald fodder, worms spin their own mummy-cases, the yards and yards of raw silk fibres that become their cocoons.

The price of silk, from the shearer's crepe de chine to stiff satins, intricate brocades and heavy taffetas, is unbelievably low in a land where the man in the street wants a foot of cotton for ceremonial occasions.

A tour of the markets in Kunming reveals that prices range from about \$1.35 to \$4.50 a yard in U.S. money, depending on weight and quality.

SILK MAKES WAY FOR COTTON In Kunming, China, they still make silk in the ancient way, slowly and carefully and beautifully. But silk is worth less than utilitarian cotton in China.

Study cotton coolie cloth rolls for almost double the price of silk. Cotton is sold by the foot to peasants and working folk, whose hands in rope hang curled to the roundness of hoe handles or ricksha shafts.

It is bought in short pieces, not for new garments but for patches. Some outfits are little but a collection of careful patches in various-colored blues, ranging from the aged white of skimmed milk to the brand new denim blue of the latest mending, the whole held together by neat, fine stitching.

But despite eight years of war and devastation, the silk crafts of China somehow survive, to re-

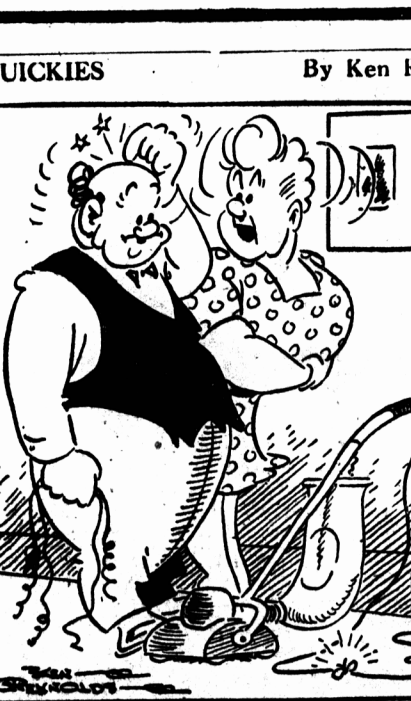
