Adult Education Meetings Will Be Held Here Today

Delegates of the Canadian Education Association plan to meet here today for their 18th annual conference. The sessions here mark the conclusion of a Maritime tour.

The first morning session will be addressed by W. Dewar McDougall, principal of the Normal Practical School, Edmonton, who will speak on the subject education through activities. The other morning session will be addressed by Dr. Leonard Goldring, superintendent of schools, Toronto, who will speak on the enterprise program in practice. Sessions also will be held in the afternoon and evening, although the conference is mainly of interest to delegates, it will be open to the public.

The evening session will be addressed by Nora Bateson of the American Librarians Association Extension Board, and Dr. Albert Mansbridge, president of the world Association for Adult Education, London, England. Dr. Mansbridge is founder of the Workers' Educational Association, the Canadian branch of which has gained considerable foothold in several parts of Nova Scotia.

The morning sessions will be held at the Canadian National Hotel and the evening session in Prince of Wales College Hall.

There are about 2,000 Mohammedans (Moslems) in Canada, including 350 in Alberta and 150 in Edmonton alone, members here said.
