NEWEST NOTES OF SCIENCE

Latvia has planned to obtain from 150,000 to 200,000 horsepower from the falls of the Dvina river above Riga.

The world's deepest telephone has been installed in a Michigan copper mine 5300 feet below the earth's surface.

In Germany owners of radio receiving sets pay small monthly license fees that are collected regularly by postmen.

A machine to solve many of the intricate problems of higher mathematics has been invented by a Virginia scientist.

The burner and air mixer in a new gas water heater can be removed for cleaning without breaking the gas connection.

The first commercial air line in Italy has begun service between Trieste and Turin with stops at Venice and Padua.

A rilling pot that uses a sliding sleeve is claimed by its inventor to be more easily adjusted than one using a screw.

A tailless airplane of English invention stabilizes itself even when the motor is stopped while it is in any position.

An extra handle has been invented that enables hand baggage to be carried from a person's arm, leaving both hands free.

A German naturalist has found that ants consume more alcohol in proportion to their weight than the hardest human drinkers.

A new rubber cap for bathers has an extension surrounding the neck that is inflated to keep a wearer's head above water.

One of several large irrigation projects planned for India will have more than 4500 miles of canals and 1700 miles of drains.

For tourists a short handled umbrella has been designed that can be folded and carried in a small box under an automobile seat.

Swiss chemists have developed a lead pigment that, when mixed with suitable paints, rustproofs iron surfaces by penetrating them.

A scraper that can be fastened to the head of a golf club with clips has been invented by a Kansas man for smoothing sand greens.

An Italian inventor is trying to apply to the rotor principle to propulsion of aircraft, the rotors being filled with gas for buoyancy.

A banjo with which novel musical effects can be obtained that have been invented has two necks and two sets of strings but a single head.

The Swedish government has appropriated more than \$285,000 for the erection of a large broadcasting station at Motala in central Sweden.

Tests at a Chicago research laboratory have shown that modern concrete is three times as strong as that made by the Romans 1800 years ago.

A treaty has been signed between the governments of Cuba and Mexico for connecting the telegraph systems of the two countries by wireless.

Prizes exceeding \$150,000 have been offered by a fund for the promotion of aviation for inventions that will increase the safety of flying.

New varieties of sugar cane have been introduced into Hawaii that require twice as much water to grow but produce double the amount of sugar.

A rigid top for automobiles that can be folded back into the body of a car and covered with a metal plate has been invented by a Michigan man.

An aerial service soon will be started between Khartoum and Kenya as the first link in a contemplated trans-African service from Cairo to the Cape.

A perforated flatiron to which steam is supplied by a small electrically heated portable boiler has been invented to renovate clothing while being worn.

The second international exhibition of inventions, intended to bring together inventors, manufacturers and financiers, will be held in London in October.

A new clothesline pulley for apartment houses is mounted on a bracket that can be swung inside a window for garments to be fastened to the line in safety.

German experimenters have found that steel can be given an extremely hard surface by heating it to a temperature in excess of 1200 degrees in nitrogen gas.

Harnessed to a hose nozzle operating at high pressure also can be used as a life belt in rescue work.

Basing his theory on observations of meteors an English scientist believes that the temperature of the earth's atmosphere at a height of 50 miles in tropical.

The oldest rolling mill in the United States, built at Bridgewater, Mass., in 1784 and the only one of its kind in the world today, is about to be dismantled.

Swedish airplane interests have established an experimental passenger service linking Goteborg, Copenhagen and Malmo and connecting with lines on the continent.

To add variety to roller skating a pole with a wheel on one end has been invented that can be used to help steer or to provide a skater, in connection with the improvement of its telephone system the French government is planning the construction of five long distance cable lines, one to reach London.

According to a list issued by the United States Department of Agriculture apple trees are susceptible to 66 diseases, tomato plants to 42, wheat to 31 and corn to 28.
