Warm Welcome Given Dominion President Of Canadian Legion At Largely Attended Meeting Held Last Evening.

"The one thing we need today in Canada is an understanding of one another's problems in order that we may unite for what is best for our country as a whole," declared Lt. Colonel W. W. Foster, D. S. O., of Vancouver, Dominion President of the Canadian Legion, British Empire Service League, in the course of a eloquent address at a largely attended meeting of war veterans and others at the Prince of Wales College hall last night.

Cabinet Decides To Stand Firm; Reports Studied

Premier Chamberlain Confers With Key Ministers—Dominions Kept Closely Informed.

(By J. F. Sanderson, Canadian Press Staff Writer) LONDON, Sept. 12.—(C. P. Cable)—Prime Minister Chamberlain and three of his trusted lieutenants, Sir John Simon, Chancellor of the Exchequer, Viscount Halifax, Foreign Secretary, and Sir Samuel Hoare, Home Secretary, met at No. 10 Downing Street tonight to give detailed study to reports of Chancellor Hitler's speech at Nuremberg.

Will Hasten Solution

Hitler's speech, despite insulting remarks aimed at Great Britain and the other democracies, probably will accelerate the British Government's efforts to put pressure on the Czechoslovaks to meet the minority in an amicable settlement, it was believed.

Firm Stand

Earlier in the day Britain's considered determination to stand firm with France in event of German aggression against Czechoslovakia received approval of the Cabinet.
