STARRETT ROPES RUSTLER THUGS

The roar of six-guns and the ill of Western music echo across the plains in Columbia Pictures' 'Rustlers of the Badlands' which opens yesterday at the Capitol Theatre. The film stars Charles Starrett in his third screen adventure as the Durango Kid, and is power-packed with excitement, suspense and lightning-triggered action.

As a civilian scout attached to the U.S. Cavalry, Starrett is sent to New Mexico to investigate cattle rustling. When he assumes the identity of the Durango Kid, the West soon blazes with fighting fury, as this Robin Hood of the range corals the outlaws and brings them to justice.

One of the reasons for the popularity of this new series is undoubtedly due to the choice of the supporting players. Tex Harding and Dub Taylor prove again to be right handy with their guns, in addition to providing the romance and comedy moments respectively for this adventure. Al Trace and His Silly Symphonists are guest featured players, and they're terrific. Saily Bliss is a very charming and genuine leading lady.

Director Derwin Abrahams turned out a thoroughly workmanlike job in combining the action, music and comedy and lets nothing deter the swiftly-moving plot. J. Benton Cheney wrote the screenplay from a story by Richard Hill Wilkinson. Colbert Clark produced the film.

to the demands made by the members of the Red Army, often at the point of a gun, to force refugees back to the countries from which they have come.

"Some have declared that they would prefer to die rather than put themselves in the Communist hands, and these have asked for a Christian death."

In his statement the Cardinal made these specific accusations against the Russians: Priests, religious orders and sisters are being deported systematically, with more than one-fifth of the 2,000 priests of the Ruthenian Catholic diocese already banished into Asia.

Ruthenian Catholics in Lower Carpathia have suffered by confiscation of Catholic property by the state and suppression of Catholic schools. Sermons are censored, priests deprived of their means of livelihood and forced to seek manual labor in order to live.

Communist propagandists hold meetings in villages to urge Catholics to join the Orthodox Church of Moscow. Priests, resisting similar pressure, are labelled "enemies of the people."

Will Attempt To Swim Niagara

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., March 1—(CP)—Husky Kirkor Hekimian, Armenian-Canadian "polar bear" will attempt to swim across the ice-filled Upper Niagara River, a mile above horseshoe falls Sunday afternoon, he said today.

Swimming in the Lower Niagara in its present condition is virtually flirting with death, but the husky swimmer is used to such feats and says he is confident he can cut a path through the icy waters.

It was officially opened by His Royal Highness, the Duke of Connaught, on August 1st, 1912, and the first patient was admitted on September 23rd of that year. Since that time you have maintained it liberally, and have provided the funds for many needed extensions, and for the continuous provision of much necessary and expensive equipment. You have been extremely loyal to your own institution, whose history during the past thirty-four years has been a record of unbroken advancement and progress. We are sure that you will regard the subscriptions you have made to the Hospital, as one of the best investments you ever made

The time has now arrived when we can no longer carry on and provide the service which our people require, without a new and larger building. Our present quarters were designed for fifty-five to sixty beds. During the past two or three years we have seldom had less than seventy patients, and, on occasion we have had to take care of over ninety. This is not fair to our patients; not fair to our medical staff; not fair to our nursing and operating personnel. Many sick people, who were desperately anxious to enter our hospital, have been compelled, through our lack of space, to go to other and more distant institutions for treatment.

Your Board of Managers has decided to immediately organize a drive for funds throughout the County in order to start the erection of a new 100 bed hospital with the least possible delay. Our last County Drive was made sixteen years ago, when we needed funds to pay for our Nurses' Home property, and an electric elevator in our main building. At that time you responded promptly and handsomely. And we believe, from contacts we have already made with some of our citizens, that we will reach, and exceed, our objective needed to make this possible.
