It is 10 or 12 inches in height and consists of a number of spirals about 1/2 of an inch at the root and tapering to the point. It has grown out of the solid rock, a piece of which is still attached in which the roots of the sponge are plainly visible. Mr. Hiscox in overhauling his trawls found this beautiful specimen. He intends showing it at the Provincial Exhibition. It was not thought that sponges grew in cold climates.
