TOO MUCH EDUCATION IN JAPAN

(By The Canadian Press) VANCOUVER, B. C. March 3.—Japan is suffering from an overdose of education, in the opinion of Dr. W. C. Barclay, of Chicago, secretary of the joint committee of the religious education board of the Women's Missionary Society, who passed through here recently on her way back from the Orient.

"Japan is facing many serious problems, but one of the most acute is education," said Dr. Barclay. "Too many people are being educated in the schools and universities for white-collar jobs, and there are not enough of those jobs to go around."

"There is an intense interest in education in Japan," Dr. Barclay continued. "But I think the interest is being a little overdone. All classes in Japan are being educated beyond their needs, so, of course, this education must eventually stop."

Everyone in Japan is interested in books and learning and being equipped for office positions, of which there will not be enough.

"Communism seems to be still very strong in Japan, especially among the students and professors of the great universities," Dr. Barclay said. "But the Japanese are a remarkable people and I have great admiration for them. They have made a great deal of limited resources and to-day the country is as modern as Canada or the United States."
