In Montague Saturday dealers were paying forty-two cents a bus for oats, twenty-two to twenty-five cents a bus for potatoes, eighteen cents a doz for eggs, eleven cents a lb for pork, twenty-two cents a lb for butter and ten cents a lb for hides.

Synopsis of Canadian North West Land Regulations. ANY person who is the sole head, of a family or any male over 18 years of age may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. The applicant must be a Canadian citizen, or the son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 30 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Pre-emption must be made within the time specified in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may take a purchased home-stead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.
