### Milk Plane Is Grounded At Summerside

A United States Army transport plane, at Summerside for fresh milk and eggs, was being kept grounded last night because of weather conditions over Newfoundland. It was the first interruption since the service began a month ago.

The plane makes twice-weekly flights—on Mondays and Thursdays—for farm produce for the United States base in Newfoundland. Several hundred gallons of milk are purchased weekly and in addition some eggs.

It was expected that the big transport might take off before daylight for Harmon Field. Impossible to replace the nets immediately because of shortages of equipment. The five boats left Summerside Sunday evening to drift for mackerel and ran into the storm a few hours later.—S.

ings he worked; Cecil Powell who relieved him was equally effective giving only one safety in three innings. Schurman and Gaudet led the Red Sox attack with four hits apiece, MacFarlane and Landry getting a trio of safeties each. Landry shone at short field handling two put outs and two assists without an error.
