Unanimous Approval Expressed By Potato Producers After Full Discussion Of Proposed Measure.

Unanimous approval of the potato marketing scheme was expressed by a standing vote of producers at a largely attended meeting held last night at Murray River. The scheme, as presented and approved at Charlottetown and other centres, was fully discussed. Address was given by Lieut. Colonel Full and Messrs. Trainor and Gillies, of the Provincial Marketing Board. Mr. Gillies, in the course of his remarks, referred to the benefits already obtained under the Provincial Livestock Marketing Board. Recently the price of hogs had been reduced in Montreal by 85 cents per 100 lbs.

DISARMAMENT (Continued from Page 1)
The importance of the results to be achieved at the forthcoming naval conference could hardly be exaggerated, he said.

Earnest Hope
It was Britain's earnest hope that an arrangement would be secured whereby competition and unnecessary expenditure on naval armaments would be avoided, he said. The government's endeavor was to reach an agreement which would leave Britain free to maintain her fleet at the minimum strength necessary to her own security and simultaneously would give equal satisfaction and a sense of security to all other powers concerned.

Series of Crises
Referring to the series of crises in the European situation during recent months, Mr. MacDonald emphasized Britain's efforts on the side of peace. He assured his audience these services would continue as long as the government lasted. Mentioning the disappointment which was felt over the results of the disarmament conference, he said the government would continue, not only to try to preserve what had been gained, but to secure agreements in ways that were still open, even if no formal conference was sitting.

Strengthens Bonds
"We seek to strengthen the bonds which unite the dominions with ourselves in common loyalty. The government came into existence to meet a crisis. It remains to secure firmly the gains of the sacrifices of our people and to lay strong foundations upon which the fabric of a great, happy, respected and morally powerful state can be built up."

Lights were turned on, and President Kennedy briefly addressed the spectators. He then called on Lieutenant-Governor DeBlois to present the trophies to the winners. Before presenting the trophies Governor DeBlois also congratulated the prize winners, and the president of the organization on the great success of the show, which is an example, he said, of what can be done by an intelligent people under capable leadership. The Governor commended the Association on the great work it has accomplished in developing a spirit of co-operation between ranchers and dealers in this province and elsewhere.

After the presentation of the trophies the President called on Premier MacMillan to address the spectators. Premier MacMillan in the course of his remarks stated that he considers the fox industry the cleanest and greatest in the world. He paid a high tribute to the late Governor Dalton as one of the founders of this great industry, which is the best paying business on Prince Edward Island this year. The speaker congratulated Mr. Callbeck on his great ability as a judge, and in conclusion advised the foxmen to continue to win glory for Prince Edward Island and themselves with their foxes.

Mr. George Callbeck on being asked to say a few words stated that it was a pleasure to act as judge at a show where all the exhibitors co-operated so splendidly. In regards to quality the foxes shown this year were very much superior to those shown the two previous years, stated Mr. Callbeck. In fact, he said, if improvement continues judging will soon be an extremely difficult task.

Mr. C. E. Rogers, the vice-president, in the course of a brief address stated that he hopes to see more entries and more visitors from the neighbouring provinces at future shows. The present show he considered to be the greatest ever held in the world.

Among other prominent foxmen present at yesterday's show was Mr. Chester S. McLure, M.P. The results of the judging during the morning are referred to yesterday as follows and the more extended list of prize winners is appended below:

Best Matched Pair, Male and Female for the Dominion Fur Sales trophy, won by Brown Bros.; A. L. Rogers, second.
