Radio Bulletins Will Make Flying Safer

(Special to The Guardian) WASHINGTON, June 15.—Radio bulletins sent out from the navy radio station at Arlington, Va., at ten thirty each morning are now giving weather data on both surface and upper air conditions that has been gathered by the U. S. weather bureau to give fundamental meteorological information to the aviation and marine interests in all parts of the country. The system will make aviation safer and tend to diminish the chances of such fatal airplane accidents due to weather conditions as occurred here just before these bulletins were begun.

Owners Will Wait Result of Ballot

(Special to The Guardian) LONDON, June 15.—Steps toward averting a great engineering stoppage, effecting 1,500,000, were taken today when the Minister of Labor held a conference with representatives of the employers and employees. The result of the conference was that the employers agreed to postpone issuing lockout notices from tomorrow until the end of June in order to enable the union to submit the employers' latest proposals to a ballot.

Artillerymen Made Splendid Showing

The Artillerymen were favored with beautiful weather yesterday afternoon for their annual inspection which was looked forward to with a great deal of interest not only by the Brigade but by citizens generally. In the past the annual inspection was usually held at a later date—mostly after the first week in July—but this year, owing to the fact that training has been curtailed, the inspection was held some weeks earlier. RICH MUSICAL TREAT AT THE PRINCE EDWARD

Large Audience Thrilled Last Night by Voice of Suberb Tenor.

The splendid audience that assembled at the Prince Edward Theatre last evening to hear Mr. Red Hollinshead, the famous New York tenor, in his song recital, must have felt themselves abundantly rewarded for their attendance. Probably never in the history of Charlottetown was such an enormous throng of people gathered to witness a musical performance. The tenor's voice was indeed difficult to imagine anything more entrancing than the glorious voice of Mr. Hollinshead or a more perfect method of using it, as was evidenced throughout a most comprehensive programme of songs. Mr. Hollinshead has been compared to the great John McCormack, and judging by last night's performance, one is almost tempted to say that the comparison is quite as much a compliment to Mr. McCormack as it is to Mr. Hollinshead. Possessed of a voice of phenomenal range (the high C being reached again and again with consummate ease) and thrilling power, together with a purity of tone-color hardly to be described, Mr. Hollinshead held his audience spell-bound from the first song to the last, carrying them along, as it were, in wave upon wave of emotion.

Murder On High Seas

BATH, ME., June 14.—Harry Wilnot, negro cook on the schooner Gardner G. Deering, was arrested on the arrival of the vessel here last night on the charge of murder of Captain T. Wallace of the Deering. Captain Wallace was shot and killed while the schooner was between Barbados and Nassau on April 25th last. Wilnot was taken to Portland, where he was arraigned before a federal commissioner today. The authorities said he told them along the way that he had shot the captain in self-defense after Captain Wallace had become temporarily deranged and had fired at him.

King of Serbia Is Near Death

(Special to The Guardian) BELGRADE, June 15.—King Peter of Serbia was reported today to be dying in the palace here. Prince Regent Alexander who has been hastily summoned from a French health resort is at his bedside.

Ten Countries Represented at McGill Medical Class

MONTREAL, June 15.—Dean Birker in his report, as Dean of the Medical Faculty at the graduation exercises at McGill University, pointed out in his resume of the year's work that the grand total of students who attended McGill last year represented ten countries. There were students from China, Switzerland, Guatemala, British Guiana, Porto Rico, the British West Indies, Finland, England, Scotland and forty-four from the United States. From the different provinces in the Dominion there were 274 from Quebec, 488 from Ontario, 47 from New Brunswick, 54 from Nova Scotia and Cape Breton, 8 from Manitoba, 13 from Newfoundland, 22 from Prince Edward Island, 29 from Alberta, 15 from Saskatchewan and 49 from British Columbia, making a total of seven hundred and fifty students registered for the year just closed. This list does not include the students of the first two years of the Faculty of Dentistry in the Medical Faculty or those of the Graduate School of Nurses.

Living Costs Decrease

(Special to The Guardian) OTTAWA, June 15.—A slight decrease in the cost of living is recorded in a statement issued by the Department of Labor. The average cost of a list of 29 staple foods in sixty cities at the end of May was \$12.25 as compared with \$12.68 in April, \$16.65 for May, and \$7.42 in May 1914.

NEW YORK, June 14.—A man suspected of a \$11,000 hold-up in the Bronx today, was charged along with a cleaver structure until he jumped into a tree and crashed 40 feet into Featherbed Lane when the branch on which he had alighted broke. He was taken to a hospital seriously injured. The hold-up occurred on Jerome Avenue at high noon, when Stephen Flannery, collector for a chain of grocery stores, was ordered by an armed bandit to hand over his thousands. He obeyed but called two policemen, who gave chase.

Big Reduction in Naval Estimates

(Special to The Guardian) LONDON, June 15.—The total expenditure proposed for this year on the building of capital ships from the British Navy is only two million pounds, Lieut Colonel Amery, parliamentary and financial secretary to the Admiralty, stated in the House of Commons today.

Greeks Will Operate Along Black Sea

CONSTANTINOPLE, June 15.—The allied High Commissioners here have authorized the Greek fleet to operate from Gallipoli at the south-western end of the sea of Marmora up through the Bosphorus and along the Black Sea to Badum on the Georgian coast. The Greeks have assigned to this duty a squadron consisting of 25 war vessels. One of the objectives of the squadron will be to prevent the Bolshevik sending munitions to the Turkish Nationalists.

Wild Scene in British Commons

LONDON, June 14.—A scene occurred in the House of Commons tonight, Joseph Devlin, who represented the Falls Divisions of Belfast, moved adjournment to call attention to the lack of discipline of the Crown forces in Belfast Sunday morning. He charged that the Crown forces, acting in concert by pre-arranged plan, were dragging men from their homes and assassinating them.

Supreme Court At Summerside

The criminal case against John Provost, charged with assaulting Martin Doyle, came up at Supreme Court in Summerside yesterday. Attorney General Johnson for the Crown and E. H. Strong for prisoner, Dr. Johnston of Tignish, the first witness called gave evidence of as to the nature of the wound inflicted upon Doyle. Mr. Strong cross examined Gilbert Doyle, uncle of the assaulted man, and his wife Sarah Doyle, were on the stand. Other witnesses were Alonzo Kehol, Doyle's neighbor, and Clifford Leah, a young lad. The case was closed and decision will be given today.

Emir Feisal Will Rule Mesopotamia

LONDON, June 14.—The British government intends to replace the British administration in Mesopotamia with an Arab assembly and an Arab ruler during the coming summer, Right Hon. Winston Churchill, secretary for the colonies, announced in the House of Commons this afternoon. The ruler will be elected by the people. Secretary Churchill made the announcement in introducing in the house a supplementary estimate of £27,000,000 for governmental expenses in the middle east. Emir Feisal, son of the King of the Hedjaz, had inquired if his candidacy would be acceptable, the secretary said, and Great Britain had replied that no obstacle would be placed in his way and that if he were elected he would have Great Britain's support. Consequently Emir Feisal had already left Mecca for Mesopotamia.
