MESSRS. SAUNDERS AND LEA ACKNOWLEDGE FAILURE

At the Liberal Convention in Ellerslie at which Mr. Campbell received the nomination, the premier stated, "If conditions are not satisfactory we cannot help it for we are doing as well as we can do." Mr. Saunders admitted last winter on the floor of the House that conditions were not satisfactory but stated that they could do nothing more. They came into power under a definite promise to enforce the law, but it has been only a farce. Recently there had been 80 drunks in the Police Court in Charlottetown and if all who were drunk had been brought up there would have been four hundred. The country is flooded with rum and Premier Lea stands up and acknowledges that he can do nothing more about it. Any self-respecting man who found himself unable to cope with such a situation would get out and let some one else try it. They have confessed and should do penance, but apparently they intend to make no restitution but persist in going on as before.

In reference to Hon. Mr. McIntyre's boast that the Liberals had made more improvements in three years than the Conservatives had in fifteen, Dr. McMillan ironically remarked that if they had borrowed five millions of dollars they might have had an even better record about which to boast.

At this point the speaker boomed in his address to remark that he noted that Hon. Mr. Lea was engaged in making his speech for Mr. Campbell, who was seated beside the Premier. Mr. Lea was known to be good at this practice. In fact he had been noticed in the House last winter giving three different member directions as to what they should say. At this point the Premier heatedly declared "I did not speak five hours in the House as you did at any rate."

"You did not need to," was the reply, "for you had three mouthpieces." However Dr. McMillan voiced the opinion that the Premier should use only his own "mouthpiece" and that Mr. Campbell should be sent back to Summerside before he was spoiled as the Liberal Government led by Mr. Lea is not a proper tutor for a young lawyer. At any rate there is little use in electing a lawyer for they will not keep them in the House—they make judges out of them.

NEW PLAYS VAUDEVILLE ORCHESTRA

Candidates Heard In Second Prince

Liberal Speakers Make Unavailing Efforts To Draw Federal Red Herrings Across Malodorous Trail Of Provincial Administration's Incompetency.

From a Conservative standpoint the joint political meeting held in St. Mark's Hall, Lot Seven, on Wednesday evening was a decided success. The attendance was large and the sentiment of the meeting was overwhelmingly Conservative. An enthusiastic reception and an attentive hearing were given to the Conservative candidate, Mr. G. Shelton Sharp, and his supporter, Dr. W. J. McMillan, M.L.A. Throughout the evening excellent order was maintained without apparent effort on the part of the chairman, Mr. Thos. Doyle. On the platform there were in addition to the above mentioned Conservative speakers, Premier Lea, Hon. J. P. McIntyre, Minister of Public Works; Hon. Peter Sinclair, Mr. W. H. Dennis and Hon. Thane Campbell, Liberal Candidate in the forthcoming bye-election, who was the first speaker.

After expressing his pleasure in meeting the electorate Mr. Campbell stated that after consultation with their respective supporters there had been arranged between himself and Mr. Sharp a mutual agreement that this is to be a clean election, neither money nor rum is to be used in influencing the voters. This bye-election is being held for the purpose of electing a member to fill the vacancy caused by the appointment of Hon. A. C. Saunders as judge of the

Supreme Court.

Federal Matters Discussed

The speaker then took up the discussion of federal politics to which he devoted over one-half of the time allotted to him. In spite of their splendid record, he said the King Government had been swept out of power by the promises of the Conservative leader. One of these promises had been that immediate steps would be taken to relieve unemployment. It is true that a special session of Parliament has been called ostensibly to consider this question but the real purpose was to effect tariff changes. Those changes the speaker characterized as of no benefit to an agricultural and fishing community. After discussing several other topics such as Highways, Old-age Pensions, etc. he urged the voters to voice a protest against the recent tariff changes by voting for the Liberal party in the forthcoming bye-election.

Reverting to local politics the speaker claimed that the present administration had given a good account of itself. Premier Lea, he maintained, is a successful farmer and has proven a good leader, but he needs in his government, a member who has the advantage of legal training and for this reason wishes the Attorney-General to be elected as a member in this district. In conclusion, he appealed for support on the ground that it would be of no advantage to the district to elect a Conservative member who would be in the Opposition during "the year and a half" that the Government retains office.

ARRAIGNS GOVERNMENT

A stern arraignment of the present administration followed. The importation of gravel instead of utilizing Island gravel was dealt with. The failure of the Government to redeem its pre-election promises was referred to, the question of prohibition being stressed particularly. Mr. Saunders had chosen prohibition as a policy because he considered it to be an issue which would particularly appeal to the people. This policy was opposed by the Conservative party because it was not real prohibition, but only political prohibition. How has this law been enforced? Is rum scarcer or harder to get? Do you have to pay 50c for a script to obtain it? Is it not true that rum is more plentiful than ever before and boot-legging is rampant? These questions elicited from the audience the reply, "Yes, it is worse than ever before!"

In dealing with the fiscal policy of the Government it was stated that in spite of the large revenue derived from taxes on motor vehicles and the grant of \$125,000 received from the Federal government, expenditures are increasing and debts piling up. This proves that the administration of affairs is not being carried on in an economical manner.

Failure to Secure Settlement of Subsidy Claims

Many delegations had travelled to Ottawa in an effort to secure a satisfactory settlement of the subsidy claims but nothing had been accomplished. Among those who had gone there for this purpose were Hon. A. C. Saunders and Hon. W. M. Lea. The former, instead of securing a satisfactory settlement of claims, returned with a Supreme Court Judgment. If they thus failed to obtain a settlement when dealing with a Liberal premier, how long would it take them to secure a settlement from Premier Bennett. What we needed was aggressive men who would have gone to Ottawa and demanded a settlement as did the Farmer premiers in the Western Provinces. The fact that our claims have not been settled proves that there was something wrong either with the

local or the Dominion Government. All know that there was something wrong with Mr. Mackenzie King and now that his Government has been replaced by a Conservative administration, we should elect a Conservative government in this province which will be in line with the government at Ottawa.

Non-enforcement of Laws

This subject was ably and convincingly discussed by the speaker. Offenders in prohibition cases appear immune from punishment. In 50 cases men who were convicted of boot-legging are still carrying on the trade. In the administration of justice all men should be equal, but this principal is disregarded by the present Government. Reference was made to the case in which a detective was hired to obtain information regarding the origin of the fire in the store of Mr. Frank McKenzie, prosecutor, in Summerside.

This man had secured information regarding the boot-legging and conduct of the speak-easies in Summerside sufficient to secure twenty convictions but this detective who had been recommended by a reliable agency was adjudged by Premier Saunders to be not responsible and he was paid a sum of money, between \$1,200 and \$1,400 and sent back to Montreal while the boot-leggers went free. Another flagrant violation of the law in which there was a miscarriage of justice was a case where parties proven guilty of fox-stealing were allowed to go with a fine of twenty dollars. Such a criminal act should have been explained by serving time.

In conclusion the speaker voiced a strong protest against the Lea Government and the manner in which this district had been served by the Liberals' who consider election of a candidate in this Second District to be easy sailing, safe and sure. It might in fact be called an incubator for Supreme Court Judges. It is a reflection upon the 2500 electors in the district that a lawyer from Summerside should be nominated to represent them for the inference would be that no one of these voters fitted to fill the position.

Minister of Public Works

The chairman next called upon Hon. J. P. McIntyre, Minister of Public Works, who gave a somewhat dull and uninteresting address in which he spoke at length upon Premier Lea's qualifications for his present position. The only thing lacking in the Government, he said, was a man with legal training and this need will be supplied by the election of Mr. Campbell. He then went on to compare the records of the Government which held office during the past three years with the record of previous governments and tried to convince the audience that more work had been done by the present administration in three years than had been accomplished in the fifteen years previous.

Dr. MacMillan Warmly Received

Dr. MacMillan, the next speaker, was greeted with a hearty round of applause for even those who are of different political affiliations from him concede the fact that he is an eloquent and forceful speaker and on this occasion he fulfilled the expecta-

tions of the audience by delivering an exceptionally interesting and informative address. He referred to the fact that Mr. Campbell is a lawyer from Summerside while Mr. Sharp has been a life-long resident of the district and it is the duty of the electors to decide which of these men shall represent them in the House. Mr. Campbell had chosen to discuss Federal politics instead of the administration of the Lea Government so the speaker would remind him that the Federal election had been held on July 28th and on that date the people had spoken in no uncertain terms. "Mr. Campbell is finding fault with the Bennett administration because they have redeemed their promises to provide for unemployment by calling a special session of Parliament. He asks you to register a protest against the changes which have been made in the tariff rates and leads you to believe that this Second District of Prince can, by electing him as their representative in the forthcoming bye-election, show their disapproval of the action of the Bennett Government in this matter." The statement that Prince Edward Island has a Farmer Premier the same as the Western provinces was contradicted by Dr. MacMillan, who stated that Mr. Lea is a farmer by profession, but politically he is a GRIT just as the speaker himself is a Tory.

Reviews Political Situation

After discussion of the failure of the Liberal government to secure adequate adjustment of the Subsidy claims the speaker referred to the queer political situation which now exists in the Second District of Prince. "This Mr. Campbell has been wished on you," he said. "He is another of Mr. Saunders' mistakes. In whose interests has Mr. Saunders always worked?—in the interests of Prince Edward Island or in the interests of Mr. A. C. Saunders. In replying to the address given him by his fellow members of the legal profession upon his elevation to the Supreme Court judgeship, he made the statement that his own ambition had always been to land on the Supreme Court Bench. The premiership and other positions held by him had been merely stepping stones. He wished to perpetuate the Family Compact so he had his law-partner, Mr. Thane Campbell, sworn in as Attorney-General and the electors of this district are now asked to ratify his mistakes. Why did they not open constituencies in Cardigan and Charlottetown? The claim is advanced that a lawyer is needed in the House, but even if Campbell is elected the Premier would no doubt ignore his advice, for Mr. Lea is an autocrat who is very fond of his own opinion. As a consequence of this fact one member of his Government, Mr. Bruce Butler has crossed the floor of the house and with others there has arisen serious disagreements. They are a happy family aren't they?" (Laughter).

Prohibition Enforcement

At the political meeting which the Liberals had held on a Sunday before the last local election Mr. Saunders had expressed his willingness to appeal to the country upon any issue which would advance the interests of the Liberal party—Government Control, Prohibition or anything else.
