Churchill In Message To Italian People

ROME, Aug. 28 (AP)—Prime Minister Churchill in a far-reaching message to the Italian people released today declared his hope that the Italian people would take their place among the leading nations of Europe, but indicated she cannot expect to sit as a full ally at the peace table at the end of the war, which he said "may not be so far off as was formerly expected."

He announced that he was directing British representatives on international bodies to "do their utmost to connect Italian hardships, and that 'large new Italian forces will soon join the Allied armies.'"

Mr. Churchill, who left Rome last Wednesday, said "I am sure those who are interested in the welfare of the Italian people will be warmly supported by our Allies."

Reds Plunge Into Hungarian Areas

LONDON, Aug. 28 (AP)—Rumanian troops crossed the Carpathian Mountains and plunged into Hungary today as other Soviet forces were reported to be moving into the Danube delta in Lower Rumania, capturing the Black Sea port of Sulina and also Tulcea, a town of 50 miles of the three river channel.

Thousands of Germans still were being captured by the hard-driving Russians, whose forward elements, stabbing toward the centre of Ploesti oil fields, were reported within 50 miles of Bucharest, Rumanian capital.

On the Northern Poland front, British troops scored a great victory, toppling the communications centre of Ostrow-Mazowiecka, 44 miles south of Warsaw, and 30 miles northeast of Warsaw.
