Madisons Take L. of C. into Camp 6-2-P. W. C. Defeat Bankers 3-1-Both Games Exceptionally Fast and Showed Good Team-Work, Only a Fair Attendance

At the arena last night the Madisons, L. O. C., Bankers and P. W. C. in the City Hockey League played two very fast games to a small attendance of excited fans.

The brand of hockey displayed by these four teams was worthy of a much larger attendance and the boys deserve a little more encouragement, as they will be among the future champion hockey players of the island and from their speed and stick handling will soon make their debut in senior ranks.

STRIBLING WAS BEATEN IN SIX ROUND GO

Jimmy Slattery, of Buffalo, Won Decision Over Contender For Light Heavyweight Crown.

BUFFALO, N. Y., Feb. 26.—Young Stribling of Macon, Ga., contender for Mike McFigue's light-heavyweight crown, lost a six-round decision to Jimmy Slattery, of Buffalo at the Broadway Auditorium tonight.

Stribling's chances of victory slipped from him at the opening of the last round, traded punches in the centre of the ring, and forced him to cover. The fight was nearly an even break at the fifth round. After the first minute of fighting in the sixth when Stribling took two hard jabs to the jaw without a return, the Georgia youth's aggressiveness melted rapidly. Before the end of the round he was forced to hang on in the clinches to escape the Buffalo boy's ripping-in-fighting.

Slattery started confidently measuring Slattery with long punches to the jaw and body and keeping himself well clear.

Slattery's confidence grew as the fight progressed and the half-expected knockout punch failed to materialize. He traded blows with less caution and forced Stribling to split the honors in the third and fourth rounds.

FIRPO - WILLS FIGHT TO BE ABANDONED

Difference Over \$50,000 Forfeit Money Is Cause of the Hitch.

NEW YORK, Feb. 26.—Negotiations by which a New York Syndicate headed by Lew Raymond sought to arrange a heavyweight match between Luis Angel Firpo, Argentine heavyweight, and Harry Wills, New York negro contender, probably will be abandoned definitely within a few days.
