Some of the important factors in a successful school are: order, attention, punctuality, good singing, if possible a Sunday School choir, suitable furniture, review at close of lesson, judicious use of blackboard with occasional illustrations, well

chosen library, teachers' meetings, systematic giving, visiting by the teachers, etc.
