Gains Outnumber Loses On Montreal Exchange

By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, Sept. 17—Speculative interest was at its lowest level in some time on the Montreal Stock Exchange today when fewer than 4,800 shares changed hands during the whole session. Gains outnumbered losses eight to five although changes were mostly of the narrowest fractions.

Dull Session Recorded On New York Market

(By Frederick Gardner) (Associated Press Financial Writer) NEW YORK, Sept. 17—Stocks hung around the lowest prices of the year on the New York market today as the market strove vainly to march to an early rally. Liquidation in the share list subsided as leading commodities took on a more robust tone and a modest upturn in steel operations indicated that seasonal expansion tendencies, although slow and restrained, were operating to some degree in business.
