Professor Theo. Ross, of Charlottetown, addressed a meeting of farmers in Margate Hall on Saturday evening, January 27th ult. The attendance was fairly good, considering the unfavorable weather and state of the roads. On the motion of Frank Glydon and George Brown, David Proffitt was appointed to the chair, who presided with his usual ability. The professor, who spoke enthusiastically for upwards of one hour and a half, was listened to very attentively by some of our Island's best and well known farmers. He spoke in eulogistic terms of the adaptability of our soil and climate as a dairy Province. He depicted in facile terms the ruinous results of the farmers selling hay, oats and potatoes off the farm instead of utilizing and converting the same into dairy products. He advocated turnips as a good root crop for all growing and dairy stock kept upon the farm, special emphasis being placed upon the quantity of surplus food supplied the animal upon which the farmer's profit depended. He concluded his able and well delivered address in referring to the need of more practical education along agricultural lines and to the still greater development of this Province's chief industry. A unanimous vote of thanks was tendered the speaker.
