#### FIVE SEAMEN RESCUED BY LINER BALTIC

NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—The rescue of five seamen from the disabled schooner Northern Light in a heavy sea was reported in a message received today at the offices of the White Star line here from J. Kearney, master of the liner Baltic, which is due in New York Monday, from Liverpool. One member of the schooner's crew, a youth of 20, was drowned and the Baltic's lifeboat was cast adrift, supposedly because the heavy sea made it impossible to hoist it back aboard ship. The sailor who was lost was Rex Parson. The schooner owned by Joe Brothers, of St. John's Newfoundland was en route from Saint John's to Bonavista Bay.

#### Bootleg Bibles Next, Minister Says In Boston

BOSTON, Dec. 6.—The head of the Episcopal order of Cowley Fathers and a neurologist were united today in their condemnation of book censorship in Boston and over Massachusetts. Father Burton assailed "spiritual snobbery" and a tendency to believe that moral reforms could be brought about by legislation while Dr. Abraham Myerson of Tufts College said "parents, neighbours and stunts, not books, corrupt the child, before a meeting of the Massachusetts committee for a revision of the book law. "If the present prudish manner of censorship persists," Father Burton said, "we shall soon have to bootleg Bibles from Canada."

#### Turks Alarmed Over Rise In Sterling Exchange

CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 6.—Alarmed by the rise in sterling exchange on the Bourse, the Turkish Government today took radical measures to protect the piastre. It ordered the temporary suspension of all government purchases abroad; informed foreign banks and societies that they must procure the Turkish Government's authorization to purchase foreign money and announced that heavy punishment would be inflicted on the authors of recent rumors that the government was contemplating a forced loan. The Bourse at Istanbul broke into a panic yesterday when sterling exchange rose to 1,093 piastres. The Minister of Finance published a statement denying rumors of a foreign loan or a forced internal loan. He attributed the crisis on the Bourse to excessive imports and decrease in Turkish exports.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 6.—William S. Vare, Philadelphia Republican leader was denied a seat in the U. S. Senate today because he spent \$785,000 to get the Pennsylvania Senatorial nomination in 1926. The Norris resolution declaring the expenditure of such a large sum of money corrupted his credentials, was adopted by the Senate.

#### Increase In Ordinary Revenue

OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 6.—Canada's total ordinary revenue for the eight months of the fiscal year which ended on November 30 last was \$310,218,838. For the corresponding eight month period a year ago, total ordinary revenue of the Dominion amounted to \$308,784,829. The increase therefore amounts to \$1,433,999. Canada's ordinary expenditure during the eight months just ended was \$239,884,848, or an increase of \$12,420,839, over the total for the corresponding eight months of the last fiscal year.

#### Wins At Chicago Poultry Show

#### Murder, Mutiny and Armed Rebellion Are Rampant In Several Parts Of Country

SHANGHAI, Dec. 6.—A plague of war and violence gripped several sections of China yesterday and threatened to spread, challenging the power of the Nationalist Government. Large scale mutiny of troops wholesale murder and munity by a communist army and armed rebellion was rampant in various parts of the country. The mutiny of the 24th division of Nationalist troops at Pukow, across the Yangtze river from Nanking, the government's capital was said by press despatches to have been joined by 15,000 men of the division. After looting Pukow yesterday the mutineers seized trains and departed for Pengu, Antwei province, receiving accessions on the way. Recognizing the seriousness of the mutiny the Nationalist government despatched 10,000 loyal troops in pursuit but the mutineers burned several railroad bridges behind them. The pursuers hampered by snow and rain could not immediately engage the rebels. The mutiny, it was reported, was brought about by the soldiers objection to being sent to Kwantung province where the Kwangsi province rebels joined with the rebellious ironside division.

#### Gasoline Boat Off Summerside Is Still Caught In The Ice—Crew Of Three Are Safe—Walked On Ice Into Summerside.

SUMMERSIDE, Dec. 6.—The gasoline boat that was reported in yesterday's Guardian caught in the ice two miles off Summerside harbor still remains in the same position. During the night lull surrounding the boat froze sufficiently solid to allow of three men to land on it whence they walked by the ice to Summerside, arriving there at 7.30. Captain Seymour Young of Alberton, in charge of the craft reported that he, with the other two men of the crew, who also belonged to Alberton, left Charlottetown on Wednesday at day.

Windsor, Ont., Banks Sought Man Found in German City — 3 Million Theft.  
MUNICH, Bavaria, Dec. 6.—Several Munich newspapers reported today that the Salzburg police had arrested Walter Dickets, whom the authorities of Windsor, Ont., had been seeking in connection with a \$3,000,000 bank larceny. Dickets is said to have committed numerous frauds in various parts of Europe. He will be tried at Salzburg for frauds he committed here and then extradited to England.

#### RECENT QUAKE BROKE CABLES

HALIFAX, N. S., Dec. 6.—That the bed of the North Atlantic was shifted as a result of the earthquake of November 18, was indicated here tonight in reports from cable ships assigned to the task of repairing the submarine breaks. Sonic soundings showed that the floor of the ocean had been moved and that the fishing banks had shifted as a result of the disturbance. Breaks in the cables connecting the old world with the new have been plotted over an area 400 miles southeast and 300 miles northeast of Halifax. In some cases breaks occurred in the same cable over a distance of 100 miles. The ships at present at sea engaged in the work of repairing the cables are the John W. MacKay, Edouard Jeremac, Lord Kelvin, and Cyrus Field. In addition, the Cambria, All American, Faraday and the Dominion have been assigned to the task.

#### Will succeed Good As War Secretary

#### NOVA SCOTIA PLEBISCITE

HALIFAX, N. S., Dec. 6.—When officially gazetted figures of the liquor plebiscite held in Nova Scotia on October 31 became known today it was learned that a majority of those voting on question number one voted against continuing the Nova Scotia Temperance Act. Before these official returns were issued, it was believed that approximately 61,000 favored the retention of the prohibitory law, against approximately 56,000 who favored its discontinuance. Thus, instead of an affirmative vote for both questions, Government Control was endorsed on one hand and the Nova Scotia Temperance Act rejected on the other. Question number one was: "Are you in favor of continuing the Nova Scotia Temperance Act?" Those answering in the affirmative numbered 64,871; negative 77,341. Question number two was "Are you in favor of the sale of alcoholic liquor under a Government Control Act?" Affirmative, 87,651; negative, 33,082.—Rejected ballots number 3069 and spoiled ballots 1590.

#### To Compete With Famous Players

TORONTO, Ont., Dec. 6.—A \$25,000,000 theatre chain to compete with Famous Players, Canadian corporation, in the Dominion amusement field is in process of establishment, and the capital already subscribed, it was stated in financial circles today. Despite denials from sources close to the officials named in the new company, it is insisted by others that the nucleus of the organization, which will be financed in Montreal, but controlled in Toronto, will be the Loew houses and new buildings to be erected in Toronto and Montreal. Eventually, the chain will spread across Canada. While there may be tie ups with American film producers the new company will not be pledged to play the product of any studio to exclusion of others.
