DEMAND FOR TOYS.

There is today, says the London
Daily News, an enormous demand
for English, Colonial and American
toys for English-made toys, and there
is no doubt that a substantial and pro-
fitable trade can be built up in this
country if the organization is taken
in hand at once.

The Central Committee of Toy In-
dustries, Limited, has been formed
for this purpose and at a meeting held
at No. 8 Horeford Gardens W., Mr. H.
Woolcombe explained to a fashionable
audience what it is hoped to do to-
wards this end. It has been stated
that no house is complete without a
baby, and it may be said perhaps with
even greater truth, that no baby is
complete without a toy.

Toy-making is particularly suited to
rural and village conditions, and as
an occupation for women and girls,
but in view of the great labor problem
that will arise with the return of so
many men from the war when peace
is proclaimed, the committee hope to
co-operate with existing societies to
encourage the employment of disab-
led soldiers and sailors in toy-making.
It is believed that the scheme can be
made to pay, but whatever the profit
may be, the shareholders are not to
receive more than 4 per cent. Divi-
dends anything beyond that will be
devoted to the organization of the
new trade.

**HOW TO SEND IN PLANTS FOR
IDENTIFICATION.**—Plants which
grow wild in Canada, or weeds, should
be sent to the Dominion Botanist,
Garden Flowers should be sent to
the Dominion Horticulturist. Various
parts of the whole plants should be
sent including the lower leaves, un-
derground stems of roots, flowers, and
if possible, fruits. Several specimens
of each plant should be sent. Common
weeds can usually be identified with-
out the flowers. Specimens may be
sent either fresh or dried. Fresh
specimens should be enclosed in a small tin
or wooden box. Specimens may be
dried by laying them between sheets
of blotting paper and spreading them
out flat, placing a weight on top and
changing the paper several times un-
til they are dry. They should be sent
between two thin sheets of cardboard
to keep them flat. When there are
two or more species they should be
numbered, and the sender should keep
a similarly numbered set for himself.
In naming them it will be necessary
to quote the numbers, as the speci-
mens are not usually returned. No post-
age need be paid on packages under
12 oz., if addressed "The Dominion
Botanist, Central Experimental Farm,
Ottawa. Several packages may be
sent free if each is under 12 oz. Each
package should bear the name and ad-
dress of the sender on a slip placed
inside or written on the wrapper.
