SOIL POSSIBILITIES.

The other day we quoted from the Farmer's Advocate a statement showing that a large number of orchard plots in the Annapolis valley were annually producing a clear income of from 10 to 20 per cent on a valuation of \$1,000 an acre by producing apples. Fancy a ten acre field made worth \$10,000 by being planted with apple trees! The prospect is dazzling.

Of course, not all soils are so well adapted to the growth of apples as the Annapolis valley, but it has been demonstrated that in various sections of our Province the gravenstein apple, which is the staple fruit which our Nova Scotia cousins produce, can be grown as plentifully, with as much certainty and of as fine a flavor as it is produced in the sister Province. Knowledge, skill and patience are required, but these can be acquired. And what is true of apples is equally true of a variety of other fruits. Strawberries for instance have been and are being grown in small plots about the Island at a handsome profit. From what we have observed and learned it would be quite possible to make a ten acre field of strawberries produce a value equal to the best orchard values in Nova Scotia. Season is late, but that can be turned to account by catering to the New England and New York market long after the American home supply has ceased, and when prices are as good as in the beginning of the season.

Gooseberries, currants, raspberries and blackberries, and even the wild blueberries, might be cultivated with the assurance of a ready market at good prices for all that could be produced, and with every assurance of better returns than can be had growing oats or potatoes. It only needs enterprise, thorough knowledge which can be easily and quickly acquired and an assured success might be in growing almost any of the small fruits we have named, and in so doing to make ten acres of land yield as large a return as the average farm of 100 acres.

If we may venture an opinion, we would say that our farmers are too much disposed to run in the old rut in the uses to which they put the soil. In some respects they are enterprising enough, notably in the purchase and use of labor-saving machinery, and the acquisition of comfortable carriages and neat harness for pleasure driving. In the matter of improved breeds of farm stock also more enterprise is shown than in turning the soil to new and more remunerative uses.

A promising field for enterprise would be for some farmer to start a nursery of all kinds of fruit trees adapted to our Island and advertise the same extensively.

Such trees would be harder than those brought from distant nurseries on the mainland, and by supplying the growing home demand would keep a considerable amount of money in the country which is now sent abroad. In fact a little thought on the subject will satisfy any intelligent farmer that there are many ways in which ten acres of land may be made to yield as much value yearly as four or five times that area devoted to growing the stereotyped crop of oats.

A late United States census report shows that there is one blind man to every 1200 of the population and one deaf man to every 50. In one respect there is a wide contrast between the two afflictions. Of the blind 65 per cent became so after reaching their twentieth year. Of the deaf, on the other hand, 91 per cent had lost their hearing before they were twenty years old.

ROJESTVENSKY'S ACQUITTAL.

Admiral Rojestvensky met a sorry figure at the onset and the end of his half-way-round-the-world journey to meet the Japanese fleet. Early in the trip occurred his panicky attack upon the fishing fleet on Dogger Bank. Months later when he met Admiral Togo in the Sea of Japan it was to meet with quick and ruinous defeat. He was badly wounded in the fight and while in a partly dazed condition gave the order to surrender.

Under the strict Russian naval code he was liable to death for having surrendered as he did. His bearing before the court-martial was that of a brave man who expected death. He asked for no lenient judgement. There is a volume in his brief address to his judges: "Sirs: Russia's fleet has been humiliated; the people have confidence in you. I await my punishment." The outcome was his acquittal, and the world endorses the verdict. Rojestvensky won more honor for himself before his judges than at the head of the Russian fleet.
