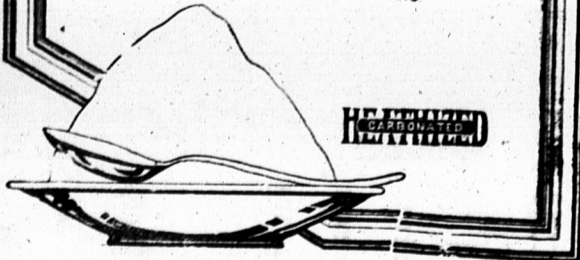

Governor General Criticized by Progressive Member

OTTAWA, July 1.—E. J. Garland, (Bow River) one of the Alberta Progressives whose vote helped to oust the Meighen Govt. issued the following statement today.

"Mr. King had no moral right to ask for a dissolution, faced as he was with a possible vote of censure, but having sought dissolution, he should not have been dealt with in the manner of a criminal. The action of the Governor General in refusing dissolution in the circumstances was a violation of the constitutional practice and calculated to reestablish the status of military governmentship from which Canada has so long been free.

But if his first act was vicious his second in refusing to retrace his steps to a constitutional position when the temporary government was defeated vividly recalls to mind the Cromwellian psychology. "Parliament was dissolved today it was learned by members of parliament from office boys and messengers. This manner of dismissal was an insult to the representatives of the people."

Lloyd George Will Visit Russia

LONDON, July 3.—Former Premier David Lloyd George's much discussed project of visiting Soviet Russia is taking definite shape and he probably will make the trip late this summer or early in autumn. It is stated today in the Londoner's Diary in the Evening Standard.

One of his main requirements, I understand, says the writer, "is an efficient interpreter who will enable him to make his enquiries and he is now casting about for such assistance. If he goes, he will visit Moscow and afterwards Southern Russia with a view to studying industrial conditions here; in this instance, he has been offered every assistance by the Soviet Government."
