

# MORGAN'S ENGLISH HOME.

Oldenham Abbey Passes Into the Hands of the American Financier.

LONDON, June 7.—Following the example of Andrew Carnegie and other American multi-millionaires, J. Pierpont Morgan, of New York, has secured a beautiful English country residence. Mr. Morgan's British home is Aldenham Abbey in Hertfordshire, which belongs to Lord Rendlesham and has recently been occupied by Charles Van Raalte, the South African millionaire. Aldenham Abbey is six miles from the famous St. Alban's Cathedral. It is situated in one of the garden spots of England. Not very far away is the town of Watford, near which are the beautiful parks and homes of the Earl of Essex and the Earl of Clarendon. Nearby also is the charming estate of Lord Ebury at Rickmansworth. The Abbey of Aldenham was occupied in the thirteenth century by a company of very picturesque abbots. The present Aldenham Abbey was built in the year 1830 close by the spot where the old mansion

stood for many centuries. Some charming ivy-clad ruins on the grounds were "faked" about sixty years ago. It is pretended that they are the remains of the old abbey of the eleventh century. They are not, however, for the father of a farm laborer still living in the village, who was a mason, helped to make them. "Ah," says this Aldenham lodge, "they're proper ruins they be. As well put together as you'll find anywhere. My father helped to build them." A local banker in 1840 paved his own with tombstones; the inscriptions upward. If his customers want a well-baked loaf they order one with "Sacred to the memory of" on the bottom of it, that being the inscription on the stone at the end near the fire. If they like it lightly baked they insist on the "Requiescat in pace" of the further end of the oven. Aldenham Abbey stands in a park of 400 acres and is really a beautiful place. A rich trout stream runs through it that is as carefully protected from poachers now as it was by the old abbots of bygone days, though invaders who come for fish have no dread of being put to death if they are caught.

## RUSSIA AS A COMPETITOR IN BRITISH MARKETS.

Russia is looming up conspicuously as a competitor of the colonies in the markets of Great Britain. Lately she has been giving special attention to the development of her trade in eggs and butter in the English market. Most of the butter comes from Siberia. Special refrigerating trains have been built, and the butter is placed in hermetically sealed compartments, with an adequate supply of ice to last through the long journey across the Urals. The trains come through directly to Riga, from which port there is a special line of steamships, which sail every week for London. A great cold storage warehouse has been built at Riga and the steamships are fitted with refrigerating plants at Kourgan and Omsk. Last year the butter exported from Russia to England was valued at over six and a half million dollars, but only a third of it was shipped directly, the rest going through Danish and German firms. This present year's export is expected to reach \$10,000,000, and, with the new facilities for handling the stuff, it is hoped to double this in a very short time. Since 1896 the value of the butter exported has quadrupled in the face of many obstacles and little encouragement.

## THE UNION JACK NOT IN IT.

A writer in the Montreal Star who was at the opening of the Pan American Exhibition at Buffalo states that one of the most noticeable features on that day was the absence of British and Canadian flags. Every South American country had bunting enough and to spare but the Canadian buildings were destitute of Canadian emblems. This is a matter that should be rectified. If Canadian visitors and exhibitors are expected at Buffalo at least common courtesy should be extended to them.

## IDENTIFIED BY A GOLD TOOTH.

CATLIN, Ill., June 7.—A gold tooth found in the woods two miles north of here Sunday was the last bit of evidence needed to prove that the skeleton found on the same spot last Saturday was that of Henry Farr, who disappeared two years ago. Farr was a liveryman at Silverwood, Ind., and left home with \$400 to buy a team at Ridge Farm, Ill. When the skeleton was found his wife identified his knife and handkerchief, but the clothes evidently had been changed. A gold front tooth was missing, and two young men made a successful search for it.

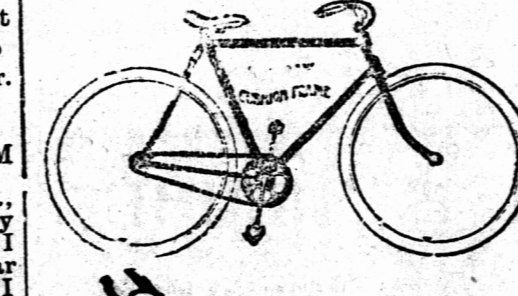
