The clock is rather larger than the typical "Sam Slick" style of time piece. dustries, the making of a better city and expressed the opinion that similar results could be obtained in Charlottetown. He believed that no better organization could be found to carry on a propaganda for improvement, than the Board of Trade and, merely as a suggestion, he would recommend that the Board take up the matter. He remembered the time, not long ago, when practically every district in the province had its carriage shop, its tailor shop, blacksmith shop, shoemaker shop. These have all gone down before modern machinery, not because there was no room for them but because there was no organization which would enable them to stem the tide.

Had there been a promoter to unite the different interests in many of those industries would be in existence to-day.

Such an organization as the Board of Trade, divided into sub-committees, each having its own sphere to work in and all working together with a common interest could not only resurrect some of these but organize new industries. He instanced a city in one of the neighboring provinces which had proceeded along this line with most marked success. The main committee in this case was sub-divided into committees on city planning, charities, civic improvement, industrial development, general work in and all working together working individually and conferring together for the betterment of the city have succeeded in making a modern, up-to-date city of a city without natural advantages.

"One thing we need in this province," said the Premier, is a spirit of optimism, every man hoping for the best, working for the best and believing in the best about his neighbors. It is the spirit that rides in every boom, that does not content about unimportant things. "And," he remarked, "the spirit that rides in every boom, that does not content about unimportant things. "We don't want the petty fault finder, the man who occupies the scorners' seat. Charlottetown has suffered from the knocker who will neither develop things himself nor want others to do so.

In the carrying out of such a plan as he had outlined, the question naturally arises, where would the money come from? In some cities the funds were provided by voluntary subscription, others raised liberal sums by public entertainments. And the best method was found beneficial in many ways besides the mere matter of raising money. It created a community of interest, enlivened and brightened the social life. When the young people take part in the activities of the city or the community it gives them a new interest. They become part of the city's life and it would be found a powerful lever in keeping them in the home land.

Another thing that would form part of the duty of such an organization as he suggested would be the securing of employment for the unemployed and he believed a great deal could be accomplished in this way to help the poor. "Let us make it our aim," he said, "to make every part of the province bright and attractive. In this way we shall keep our people at home. He concluded with a complimentary reference to the concise and practical question framed by the President for discussion at this meeting.

Consul Frost was the next speaker. In a well-worded and eloquent address Mr. Frost took up the question. If the discussion, he said, failed to bring forth an immediate solution, it should not be cause for discouragement. Hundreds of carefully laid plans for individual betterment had failed to bring forth the results directly aimed at but such discussion is always beneficial. If the agitation for the tunnel had not continued for years the car ferry would not have materialized. If the agitation for the preservation of the shell-fish industry had not taken place the yster development now in sight would not have resulted. Mr. Frost referred to the old orthodox habit of exhausting the natural resources. The forests of the province have been converted into ships; the fisheries had been depleted; the soil fertility had been exhausted. These gone, attention has been turned to manufacturing. He considered that the difficulties supposed to stand in the way of manufacturing in this province have been exaggerated. There are three conspicuous requisites for the success of manufacturing industries. These are fuel, raw material and transportation. He suggested that such manufacturing as required the least steam power, raw material light in weight or compact in bulk and to aim only at high class production, the use of the name "Prince Edward Island" on all products exported and the name to be a guarantee of the best possible.

Space and time prevent giving even an idea of this excellent address, full of valuable suggestions, some of which will be taken up later.

Consul Frost was followed by Publicity Agent McCready, A. B. Warburton and W. F. Tidmarsh. A unanimous vote of thanks was tendered the two principal speakers and the meeting closed with the National Anthem.
