Jackson Stars As Leafs Blank Rangers 4-0

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) TORONTO, Jan. 24—Harvey Jackson led Toronto Maple Leafs to a decisive 4-0 victory over New York Rangers before almost 13,000 persons here Saturday night. The big left winger scored three goals as Leafs chalked up their first win in three games against Lester Patrick's team.

Jackson stood out in a fast Leaf attack that outlasted anything the New Yorkers had to offer. He scored in the first period and rapped in two goals in the third. Sylvanus Apps, centre on Jackson's line, tallied the fourth and Gordon Drillon, right wing on the same trio, assisted in Jackson's third goal.

A fist fight, started by Red Horner and Art Coulter, held up the game for five minutes toward the end of the third period. When the officials had untangled the mass of players who joined in the fray they imposed major penalties on Horner, Coulter and Bill Thoms, who had come to the assistance of his teammate.

Dudley Wins Sacramento Open Tourney

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) SACRAMENTO, Calif., Jan. 24—Dudley, veteran golf campaigner, came charging home today with two subpar rounds to post a 72-hole total 273 and win the \$3,000 Sacramento open from a formidable field.

Twice a member of the Ryder Cup team and winner of the last Philadelphia and Shawnee opens, Dudley cracked par, the course record and the opposition in putting together one of the lowest 72-hole totals in golf records, Bill Mehlhorn turned in 271 in winning the E. Fuso open in 1925 and Lawson Little equaled this mark in the 1936 Canadian open. These marks were set on a course considerably shorter than the 6,700 yard long municipal links here. Harry Cooper, of Chicago, had a 69 and 70 in his final rounds to place second.

(CP)—Executive officers of the Cape Breton Colliery Baseball League today formally applied for affiliation with the National Association of professional baseball leagues.

Decision to apply for affiliation as a class "D" team was unanimous. Application of New Glasgow interests for a franchise in the five-team league was refused.

Ross Yanks Goalie To Earn 5-6 Tie With Americans; Canucks Defeat Hawks 4-1

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) BCSTON, Jan. 24—A third period rally that letted them six goals gave Boston Bruins a 6-5 overtime tie with New York Americans in a thrilling National Hockey League battle here tonight before 10,000 fans. Art Ross, Bruins manager, yanked his goalie in the last minute of play and veteran Hooley Smith snatched victory from Amerks by scoring the tying goal with only 12 seconds to go.

It was probably one of the most weird games in the Boston's hockey history. It started with only one of the two referees on the scene, Ag Smith.

The Bruins' tying tally, by Smith according to a hasty check-up of available records, has never been matched. Trailing 5-6, with 30 seconds to play, Manager Art Ross yanked Tiny Thompson, his goalie, to throw six forwards into the wild scramble for the tying goal.

The Bruins' deadlocking score started from a quarter ice face-off. The puck was baited out to Peggy O'Neil, stationed to the left of the New York net, and when his close-up shot was stopped by Lorne Chabot, Smith swept in to drive the puck into his cage.

STRENGTHEN LEAD

CHICAGO, Jan. 24—Montreal's fast stopping Canadiens tightened their hold on first place in the Canadian division of the National Hockey League tonight by handing Chicago Black Hawks a 4-1 defeat in a fast, well-played battle before 11,000 fans.

The veteran line of Morenz, Gagnon and Joliat picked up two of the Montreal goals and although the Chicagoans matched the visitors in speed and fight they could not keep pace in smooth passing and accurate shooting.

Morenz opened the scoring at 1:05 on a pass from Joliat and the goal was the only one of the first period.

The second Chicago put on a drive which ended with Palangio scoring the tying goal, but Lorrain came back to put the visitors out in front again and Joliat added to the margin by scoring on Gagnon's pass.

In the final period Lorrain scored his second goal in the last minute of play, rifling a pretty shot from right wing that beat Karakas cleanly.

There were but four penalties, three against the visitors, for whom the victory was their sixteenth of the season. For Chicago it was a sixteenth defeat.

Maroons Hold Red Wings To Overtime Tie

Rangers Revenge Shutout By Defeating Leafs 4-2; Wings Nip Maroons 2-1

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, Jan. 24—The New York Rangers defeated Toronto Maple Leafs 4-2 in a gruelling National Hockey League match played before 13,000 spectators here tonight. The triumph gave Rangers undisputed possession of second place in the United States division, one point in the van of the Boston Bruins.

Exceptional leniency by the officials enabled the players to deal out lousy body checks almost at will and several times the game threatened to break out into a free-for-all.

Neil Colville, rookie centre, shot the New Yorkers into the lead at the three-quarter mark of the opening frame following a passing bout with his brother Mac and Alex Shibley.

Butch Keeling blazed one into the Toronto cage half way through the second chapter on a pass from Phil Watson.

Toronto's first counter came early in the third period when Bob Davidson's shot was deflected into the New York cage by defenceman Babe Pratt. Cecil Dillon scored less than two minutes later when Art Jackson put the Leafs back in the running by slapping Red Horner's rebound past the Ranger net minder.

Fireworks developed in the last moment of play when Butch Keeling notched his second marker on Phil Watson's assist just before the final buzzer sounded. Conny Smythe, Toronto's managing director dashed across the ice to the scorer's box and Art Coulter, Ranger rearguard, apparently thought Keeling's goal was to be disallowed for he started arguing with Smythe who swung on the Ranger. Officials separated the pair before any further damage was done.
