3RD READING OF BILLS IN LEGISLATURE

Provincial Legislature, March 15. The House met at 4:10 p. m. Answers to a number of questions were tabled.

Hon. Mr. McLean presented a petition from the Mayor and Councilors of the Town of Souris for an Act to Amend the Souris Incorporation Act 1910.

Mr. J. Augustine MacDonald presented a petition from Rev. Joseph McGree and others for an Act to incorporate the congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer.

Mr. Bethune presented a petition from Daniel McEwen and others for an Act to incorporate the Long Creek Hall Company.

Hon. Dr. MacMillan presented a petition from the Mayor and Councilors of the City of Charlottetown for an Act to further amend the City of Charlottetown Incorporation Act.

Bills in accord with the foregoing petitions were received and read a first time.

A resolution of thanks to the Provincial Minister of Education from the Board of School Trustees of Summerside (referred to elsewhere in this issue) was on motion of Mr. Allen ordered to be placed in the Journals of the House.

Third reading was given to the following bills: The Parents Maintenance Act. An Act to provide for the transfer of the duties of the Prince Edward Island Provincial Police to the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. The Public Vehicle Act. An Act to amend the Jury Act. An Act to amend the Succession Duty Act. An Act to incorporate King's County Hospital. An Act to incorporate the Souris Skating Rink Co. Ltd. An Act to amend the Voluntary Winding Up Act.

(As an amendment to the motion for final reading of the Public Vehicle Act Mr. LePage moved, seconded by Mr. McIntyre that the Public Vehicle Act be not now read a third time but that it be read six months hence. The House divided on the amendment on straight party lines 10-15 and the original motion carried on the same division.)

On motion of Hon. Dr. MacMillan the House went into committee with Mr. W. A. Stewart in the chair on second reading of an Act to incorporate the Prince Edward Island Pharmaceutical Association.

The bill amends the existing statute, making it compulsory for dis-

pers of medicines in hospitals to qualify as druggists in the usual way. It was agreed to without amendment.

Insurance Act On motion of Hon. Mr. McPhee the House went into committee with Mr. Strong in the chair on second reading of The Insurance Act.

(The promoter's explanation of the purpose and scope of the bill is published elsewhere in today's Guardian.)

The promoter suggested that the bill be first read clause by clause, then the committee could return to consideration of any particular clauses requiring further explanation or discussion.

After some discussion by Messrs. T. A. Campbell, LePage, J. A. Macdonald, and Hon. Dr. MacMillan, progress was reported and the House adjourned, to meet Thursday morning at 10 o'clock.

Maritime Brief

Mr. Dennis asked the Leader of the Government to table answers to the following questions:

1. Was there a joint representation of the Maritime Province Governments made to the Hon. Minister of Agriculture or to the Federal Government at Ottawa as to the nature of claims and demands of these Provinces to be placed before the Economic Conference at Ottawa?

2. Table all correspondence between the Maritime Province Governments and with Federal Minister and Officials in this connection and also all agreements entered into before, during and after the Conference.

Answer: (1) Yes. (2) Tabled herewith.

Falconwood

Mr. McIntyre asked the Minister of Public Works:

1. Have tenders been called for the rebuilding of Falconwood? If so give names of contractors?

2. Give amount of each tender. 3. How much gravel was hauled to Falconwood last year? From whom was it purchased, and what price paid?

Answer: (1) and 2) See answer to Question 9. (3) 1,678 79/2000 tons of gravel were hauled to Falconwood Hospital. Gravel was purchased from Warren Bituminous Paving Company Limited at \$1.00 per ton, f.o.b. shipping point. Amount paid was \$1,678.79.

Government Garage

Mr. McIntyre asked the Minister of Public Works:

(1) Give names of persons in Government garage. Amount paid each one. (2) Give total cost of operation of Government garage in 1932, including repairs to all machines, extras bought and on hand.

(3) Total wages paid to all employees during 1932. (4) Did Government purchase any machinery? If so, give number of new machines bought for road work in 1932; price paid for each machine; from whom were they purchased? Were tenders called for said machines? If so, give names of lowest tender and amount paid for each tender.

(5) Give total cost of all new machinery bought in 1932 for road maintenance or other work on highways.

Answer: (1) L. C. Boehner, \$400 per day; Arthur Campbell \$400 per day. The following at \$3.50 per day: Joseph McInnis, Lyle Boehner, Roy E. Leard, John McAleer, Roy Cox, Gordon Lord, Theodore DesRoches, John Weeks, L. McMillan (temporary).

(2) The total cost of operating Government Garage, including the purchase of machinery, for 1932 was \$50,132.85, see pages 136 and 137 Public Works Report 1932. Of this amount \$19,300.23 was paid for new machinery as follows:

3. Was this malt extract removed to any part of the city? If so, give names of parties who have charge of it at the present time.

4. Give names and addresses of all Prohibition Officers employed by the present Liquor Commission, giving time of said employment, also salaries paid to each.

5. How many convictions were received against offenders by each one of said officers?
