WEDNESDAY. Died at his home, Springbrook, New London, Sept. 15th, Leland Carnard Ferguson after an illness of one year of tuberculosis brought on by a severe cold. He leaves to mourn beside his parents two brothers—George F. at home, Lyndley M. of North Bay, Ontario, and one sister Janie Irene at home; also an aged grandmother Mrs. George Anderson now in her ninety-third year, to whom he was much attached and had always shown her much kindness and attention. He was a young man of great promise and was a special favorite with young and old for his cheerful and genial disposition. He always had a kind word and pleasant smile for all. The funeral which was largely attended by his friends and neighbors was ably conducted by his pastor Rev. Mr. Sutherland. He was laid away in the beautiful grounds of the Geddie Memorial churchyard only a short distance from his late home.

FRIDAY. A meeting of the Board of Health was held last evening in the Council Chamber. Dr. H. D. Johnson, the Health Officer, reported that the health conditions in this city were not all that could be desired. The City provides no public place to deposit to refuse from yards and closets and the sanitary officer finds it difficult to carry out the provisions of the health by-laws.

The Sanitary Officer has not time to devote to the proper performance of his duties. Premises where typhoid patients lived were not properly cleaned and disinfected after the

cases occur with the result that typhoid very often reappears the following season, so that there is a grave danger that next season there may be ten times as much typhoid. The Sanitary Officer reported that the premises of one of the typhoid patients was in a very unsanitary condition. It was ordered that medical doctors of the city be notified to report all cases of contagious diseases to the Health officer within forty-eight hours.

It was ordered that the Sanitary Officer be instructed to procure a list of premises in this city that are in an unsanitary condition and dangerous to the public health, and that he order the owners of such premises to at once place such in proper sanitary condition by connecting with the city sewerage system wherever possible. Mr. McGregor suggested that persons hauling manure from the city should be compelled to have their carts or wagons covered in to prevent the contents from dropping on the streets. It was pointed out that the health by-law provided for cases of this kind and would be enforced. It was ordered that the health officer make enquiry as to the source of the present typhoid infection in the city and report the result to the Board of Health. The Board then adjourned.
