PITTSBURG, Sept. 22.—An order issued in Orphans Court here today provides for the payment to Harry K. Thaw of \$142,124 due him from the Coke Trust created by the will of his father, William Thaw. It was the second payment made to Thaw since last June, when he won his suit against the Fidelity Title and Trust Company of Pittsburg, trustee compelling it to pay him the money as it became due. At that time he received \$160,780.
