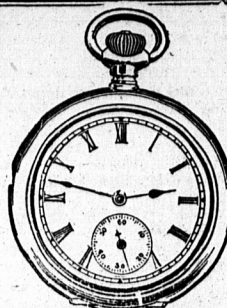

Fears are entertained for the safety

of the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal

Company's steamer Wobun, says a

North Sydney despatch, which sailed

last Tuesday for St. John's, with a

cargo of coal. The steamer has not

been reported from St. John's, as

yet, and her whereabouts are un-

known to her owners. It is stated

here today that the storm which

swept over Newfoundland was the

worst in the history. The snow lies

thirty-five feet deep in places, and

traffic is demoralized. The Anglican

church at Little River has been

blown down, and a train and five

five cars blown off the track. No

fatalities as a result of the storm are

reported. (The Wobun is well known

here.)
