It was decided that all who have contributed their rant during the current year to the burying ground Restoration Fund shall be invited to meet on the third Monday in November of each year to receive the report of the committee of management and to select a new committee for the calendar year next ensuing. A subscription list was opened and in the vicinity of \$400.00 was at once subscribed which will go towards the fund to be provided for improving the grounds, resetting the monuments and tombstones, and keeping the cemetery in first class order from now on.

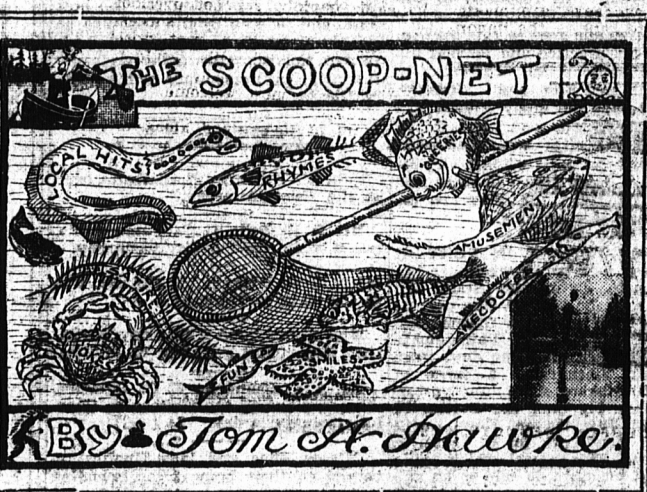
