

Target In The Kuriles



ARAIDO, SHIMUSHU, PARAMUSHIRU ISLAND, SOVIET RUSSIA

Paramushiru, 60 miles long, 20 miles wide, is situated with volcanoes, was obtained by Japan in trade with Russia in 1875. A near-Jap base at Aleutians, Paramushiru has a native population of 4400, is northernmost of Kuriles, stepping-stone islands to Tokyo.

Paramushiru, naval-air base at the northernmost tip of the Japanese empire, is on the American bombing schedule now, and may some day be an invasion target. Used as a supply point for the Jap base at Kiska, Paramushiru is well within bomber range of U.S. bases in the western Aleutians. Knockout of this island in the Kurile chain is an initial step in the march on Tokyo.

Less Prairie Wheat; More Oats, Barley

OTTAWA, July 23 (CP) — A reduction of almost 4,000,000 acres in the area seeded to wheat in the three Prairie Provinces this year was reported today by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics.

The figures are based on returns from the annual June survey and show that the wheat area this year in Western Canada is 16,728,000 acres compared with 20,683,000 acres in 1942, a decrease of 19 per cent., said the bureau.

While production in wheat acreage this year amounts to 3,924,000 acres, the combined increase in acreage seeded to oats, barley and flaxseed is 4,907,900 acres over the 1942 level for these crops.

Alexander Has Warm Praise For Canadians

AN ALLIED COMMAND POST, NORTH AFRICA, July 22 (CP Cable) — Gen. Sir Harold Alexander, second in command of the Sicilian campaign, told Canadian war correspondents today the Canadians have gone far and fast in the battle of Sicily.

At an informal reception held at his North African headquarters Gen. Alexander said, "The Canadians are good and they will be jolly good."

"Like the American 45th division they went into battle untired and have done exceedingly well," the deputy commander-in-chief of the Allied forces added. "The Canadians are fine material; they have had very good basic training and they have learned from the experiences of others. They have gone far and fast in this battle. They will be as good as any troops."

The famed commander of the 15th Army group compared the Canadians to a football team. "No matter how much training a team has I don't think it's so much that it has had some first class matches," he said.

Then he explained why the Canadians had been put in the line between the British forces and the Germans. "Was it deliberate?" asked a correspondent.

Our two cars were met at the headquarters gate by the General's aide, Major M.C.C. Cunningham of the 1st Hussars. We walked several hundred yards down a picturesque path, winding its way under swaying palm trees, and came to the General's headquarters on wheels, a specially built-in interior.

"The Canadian correspondents are here," said the military assistant. Immediately the General stepped down the ladder leading to his quarters and gave each a warm handshake as Maj. Ian Wilson of the Canadian Army Public Relations Staff introduced each one.

A peep inside Gen. Alexander's mobile office revealed a large map of Sicily and above it a panoramic display of some of his pet rifles. On the other desk there were stacks of documents, an autographed photograph of Field Marshal Smuts, South Africa's Prime Minister, and snaps of the General's wife and children in modest wooden frames.

There also were a small oil burning stove and a miniature book shelf, one of the books being "The Importance of Living" by the Chinese author, Lin Yutang.

During the informal reception the correspondents had a glimpse of Air Marshal Arthur Coningham, Commander in Chief of the Allied Air Forces.
