Fire Destroys Country Home

Inkerman Shore is beyond the city limits and the firemen had no water available with which to fight the fire. The fire was first noticed by Mr. Birt who gained entrance and was successful in saving a number of pieces of furniture on the lower floor.

Communists Plan Parade In London

Branley, London Communist committee chief, declared there would be 10,000 Communists and sympathizers in the line of march.

GOVERNMENT FORCES RESIST REBEL ADVANCE

Claim Fresh Victories in Northern and Eastern Sectors.

Spanish Government forces claimed fresh victories in the Northern and Eastern sectors yesterday while stubbornly resisting enemy thrusts in the Madrid area. Insurgent troops advancing on Madrid along the Maqueda-Madrid highway were repulsed near Vamojado. At Burgos, insurgent military leaders said they had purposely delayed the advance on Madrid to see what strength the Madrid Government could muster. They sought to ridicule the "impotence" of the Madrid counter-attacks. At Madrid the Government set up a fund of \$650,000 to further the work of constructing trenches and barricades in the city's streets. Asturian miners attacking Oviedo were reported to have driven the insurgent defenders to last-ditch positions in the centre of the city. The Madrid Government announced 6,000 children had been evacuated from the capital and were being cared for in Barcelona.

PREPARE FOR SIEGE

MADRID, Oct. 7—(AP)—Socialist and Communist defenders dug in tonight for "last ditch" street fighting if their comrades outside the capital fail to stem the advancing Fascists. To speed the work of scoring the streets with trenches and throwing up barricades, the Government set up a fund of \$650,000.

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Glace Bay Mine Remains Idle

GLACE BAY, N.S., Oct. 7—(C.P.)—Idle miners of No. 24 colliery, who insist they are not on strike refused tonight to accept a recommendation of Mines Minister Michael Dwyer that they return to work pending investigation of alleged "unsafe working conditions" in the pit. More than 400 men have been idle since Monday when the mine's coal cutters refused to go below until the Dominion Coal Company replaced eight-inch bars on the cutting machines with six-inch bars. Following a meeting, the miners declared their demands were "in the interests of safety." Company officials, stating the tie-up is a breach of contract, have refused to negotiate until the men return to work.

NO INTENTION OF ATTACHING BANK ACCOUNTS

Premier Aberhart Denies Report Published in Calgary.

WARNER, ALTA., Oct. 7—(CP)—"The Alberta Government has no intention of attaching bank accounts or negotiable securities," declared Premier Aberhart here today. "That is far from our idea." It was the Premier's answer to a report published in Calgary today that bank depositors and security holders "feared the Alberta Government was contemplating attaching accounts and negotiable securities." Fear of Government action, the report said, had resulted in millions of dollars in cash and negotiable securities being transferred to banks in Eastern Canada and the United States. Shown the Calgary report which had been \$5,000,000 and \$6,000,000 have been transferred to banks outside the province in the past month, the Premier earlier said: "I don't believe it."

Labor Party Votes Down Communism

EDINBURGH, Oct. 7—(CP)—The Labor Party today voted to keep free from Communism. Its membership, by 1,728,000 to 592,000 votes, rejected a proposal for affiliation with the Communist Party to combat Fascism. The vote, taken by postcard, was announced at the annual conference of the party which today heard delegates from Spain plead the cause of the Madrid Government in its struggle with Fascist forces.

VIOLATION OF NEUTRALITY PACT CHARGED

Claim Germany, Italy and Portugal Supplying Arms and Planes to Rebels.

MOSCOW, Oct. 7—(AP)—The Soviet Union in a communication made public tonight declared it would seek again a free hand in Spain unless Portugal, Italy and Germany immediately halt military assistance to the Spanish insurgents. The note was delivered by Molisevich Kagan, Russian representative on the non-intervention committee, to representatives of the signatory countries in London. "If violations are not stopped immediately, the Soviet Government will free itself from any obligations to the agreement," the communication said.

CLAIM VIOLATION

Kagan specifically charged Germany, Italy and Portugal with sending arms and war planes to the insurgents in direct violation of the International Neutrality Pact which they signed. "The Soviet Government," the note declared, "cannot consent to conversion of the non-interference pact into a screen for concealing military assistance rendered the rebels against the Government by some participants of the pact. "The rebels now possess many bombing planes of German and Italian origin which did not belong previously to the Spanish army," it was charged, "and the testimony of witnesses proves that supplies of arms from Portugal continue."

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Complete Second Atlantic Flight

NEW YORK, Oct. 7 (AP)—The 10-ton German flying boat Zephir was anchored off a Port Washington, N.Y., pier tonight after completing its second non-stop flight from the Azores in 18 hours, 20 minutes. Catapulted off the mother ship Schwabenland, anchored off the Port of Horta, in the Azores, the Zephir arrived at Port Washington today, breaking its own record and that of the Aeolus, a sister ship, in their flight over the Atlantic. The Aeolus put in at Port Washington from the Azores yesterday after its first non-stop flight over the 2,300-mile span. R. A. Jahn, airline official, said both flying ships would be docked until Oct. 13 when they would probably make test flights to Nova Scotia.

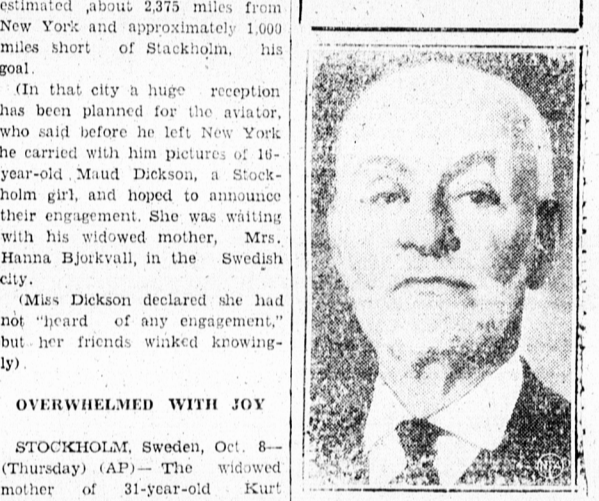
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Picked Up In The Atlantic By French Trawler

Wireless Message Reveals Safety Of Lone Trans-Atlantic Aviator.

VALENTIA, IRELAND, Oct. 7 (AP)—Forced down in the Atlantic on an attempted direct flight from New York to Stockholm, Kurt Bjorkvall was rescued tonight by the French trawler Imbrin off the Westernmost Point of Ireland. First word from the long overdue Swedish airman, who had not been reported since he took off from Floyd Bennett field at 8:35 A. M. A. S. T. Tuesday, came in a wireless message from the trawler. "Bjorkvall sauve (saved)," it said. The 31-year-old flyer, the trawler's skipper said, was "minding (correct) his apparatus." "Will attempt take in tow to Valentia tomorrow," added the message received here.

Death Mourned

DISCUSS NEW BANK SET-UP

Directors Hold Initial Meeting in Ottawa.

OTTAWA, Oct. 8—(CP)—All six new directors of the Bank of Canada, appointed to represent the Government when the federal treasury assumed majority ownership of the capital stock early in September, attended today's regular meeting of the board. It was the first meeting since the change in ownership and control was made effective last Sept. 11. Routine matters occupied the directors and there was no change in the executive which consists of Graham Ford Towers, and C. A. Osborne, governor and deputy governor, W. C. Clark, deputy minister of finance, and Thomas Bradshaw, executive member of the board of directors. Some discussion was devoted to the new structure which will be erected here to house the Bank of Canada. Construction of the new building will start early in the spring. The new directors include J. LeRoy Holman Summerside, P.E.I. and Fred McGee, Port Elgin, N.B. Each director has two votes, giving the Government a preponderance of voting power over the seven-directors representing privately-held shares.
