Britain To Relinquish Control Over Egypt

Change In British Status In Egypt Seems Certain If Proposed Treaty Is Brought Into Effect.

(Special to The Guardian)
LONDON, Aug. 5.—It is understood that relinquishment of the greater part of British control over Egypt has been agreed upon in an understanding arrived at between Premier Ramsay MacDonald, Foreign Secretary Arthur Henderson, Air Minister Lord Thomson and King Fuad of Egypt and his ministers, subject to the approval of the British cabinet and that points have been determined which will be incorporated in a draft treaty.

As there is no doubt that the cabinet will assent and that the Egyptians will welcome the concessions, a change in the British status in Egypt seems certain to become an accomplished fact if the Labor government lasts long enough to bring the treaty into effect.

British troops, it has been agreed, will be withdrawn from Cairo and the interior and concentrated on the Suez Canal. Egyptian troops will be admitted into the Sudan, where they will act with British troops. Consular and mixed courts will be given up providing other powers agree to do the same.

The office of British high com-

missioner for Egypt will be abolished but Great Britain will insist upon appointing foreign financial and legal advisers to the Egyptian government. Great Britain will support Egyptian application for membership in the League of Nations. All right of exercising domestic police powers in Egypt will be renounced by Great Britain.

Sale Of Liquor Nets Profit

REGINA, Aug. 5.—The sale of liquor in the province netted the Saskatchewan government a profit of \$3,083,947.46 for the fiscal year ending March 31, it was disclosed in an announcement made by the government, an increase of more than \$800,000 as compared with figures for the previous year. In the period covered total sales of beer and liquors amounted to \$14,607,805.68. As the result of increased profits, liquor prices will be lower commencing September 1, the statement announced.

LEAMINGTON, Ont., Aug. 5.—The harvest of the first Turkish cigarette tobacco ever to be grown in Canada in commercial quantities is now in full swing in this district, and has demonstrated conclusively that this variety of tobacco grows in this climate better than it grows in Macedonia which has been the centre of its culture for centuries.

Fishing Industry Will Be Affected

OTTAWA, Aug. 5.—The fishing industry of Canada will be affected seriously if proposed changes in the fisheries schedules of the United States tariff become law. This is indicated in a statement handed out today by the Department of Marine and Fisheries. The statement goes into the changes proposed by the Hawley Bill, and points to the matter of material increase provided for in that measure. Changes proposed by the Senate Committee in the Hawley Bill would not, generally speaking, minimize the serious effect on the sea fisheries of Canada, it is stated. The Hawley Bill, the statement declares, proposes increases in the duty against Canadian smoked filets, smoked herring, dried and salted fish and boneless fish.

Senator Swanson Attacks Hoover

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 5.—Indications of a sharp debate in Congress over President Hoover's action in postponing the laying down of three ships of the fifteen-cruiser program became more apparent over the weekend, as Senator Swanson of Virginia, added his voice to the attack that has centred upon the proposed curtailment. Senator Swanson, ranking Democrat on the Senate Naval Committee, took a position beside Senator Hale, chairman of the Naval Committee, Chairman Borah of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, and Chairman Britten of the House Naval Affairs Committee, three members of the administration party, who already have announced opposition to the president's course. The Virginian, however, was more blunt in expressing his condemnation. Describing Mr. Hoover's action as "contrary to law," he said it behooved in the president, especially when he has appointed a committee to study law enforcement, to obey the law himself.

Cabinet Meets In Ottawa Today

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 5.—After an interval of some weeks, Premier Mackenzie King and members of his cabinet will meet tomorrow. The meeting, which may result in some important decisions, will bring together ministers who have been out of the city for some time. Hon. J. A. Robb, Minister of Finance, returning from a tour of western Canada, will be present. Hon. Robt. Forke, Minister of Immigration, who has also been in the west has returned to Ottawa, and will be among those at the meeting.

Home From Mission Field Of South Rhodesia

Among the large number of former islanders who have recently returned to their native province, is Rev. Walter Cotton who, as a member of the Community of the Resurrection is working in the mission fields of Southern Rhodesia at Penhalonga, a gold-mining centre near the boundary of Portuguese East Africa. Father Cotton is a son of the late Mr. W. L. Cotton and has been engaged in missionary work in the Dark Continent for the past twenty years. He is at present located at Penhalonga where his society maintains a large school where three hundred natives of the Bantu tribes of both sexes are educated and trained. Penhalonga is but a short distance from Umtali, the home of Mr. Lionel Cripps, a member of the Empire Parliamentary Association who visited Charlottetown last autumn.

ARROW PARK, Eng., Aug. 5.—War bitterness was buried in striking fashion on this anniversary of the outbreak of the World War when German boy scouts stood with their English, French and Belgian comrades and with boys of many other nations in a great international thanksgiving service.

There were 30,000 scouts, representing almost every faith and every nationality at the service, and it seemed that only the strongest bonds of comradeship could have induced them to stand exposed to the deluge which swept over the park as the service ended.

The Archbishop of Canterbury, robed in purple and scarlet, conducted the service from the Royal Box and by his side was Baron Robert Baden-Powell, who dreamed his dream of universal brotherhood 21 years ago.

Conservatives Confident Of Making Gains

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 5.—In event of a provincial election this year, the Conservatives in the eastern district, of which Ottawa is the centre, are confident of making gains. At present they hold 12 of the 16 constituencies. In the last election in these constituencies the liquor question and Regulation 17 were, on the whole, liabilities to the Conservatives, and cost many votes, among both the English and French-speaking electors. They brought considerable new support, but not equal to that which was alienated.

It is evident that government control of the liquor traffic will not be a factor in the next contest. W. E. N. Sinclair's conversation to the Ferguson liquor policy has removed this as an issue; and thousands of Conservative prohibitionists, who last election abstained from voting or voted against their party will now return to their old allegiance.
