LOYAL CRUSADERS.—The meeting of Company A, last evening was one of more than ordinary interest. EASTERN NOTES.—Stormy weather, lots of sickness, and hauling and preparing firewood are the chief items of interest in this section of the country at present.—The Steamer Stanley was off the East Point some days the first of the week about four miles from shore surrounded by a large body of ice. How little the authorities at Ottawa, warming themselves at good coal fires, paid for by the people, know about the winter navigation of the Gulf is demonstrated by their order for her to go to the aid of the imprisoned Gaspesia somewhere on the Gaspe coast. Though the Gaspesia heroically worked her way in mid winter along the northern edge of the Gulf to Paspébiac, no vessel built by human hands is going to force her way through the present heavy and irregular sea ice to that portion of the Gulf from East Point, and could some of the fresh water sailors who guide our marine affairs from Ottawa—and guide them according to the best light they have, and guide them in the interest of humanity and for the public good—stand on the eastern end of our Island to day, and look north and west at the continuous fields of ice, they would come to the conclusion that every man here has long arrived at, that such orders can never be carried out. That the northern edge of the ice field may be broken and scattered at certain periods of the winter the Gaspesia proved on her present eastern voyage, but that continuous winter navigation is not feasible, her present forced detention amply demonstrates.—(The arrival of the Stanley at Georgetown and the release of the Gaspesia were apparently not known to our correspondent when he wrote THE GUARDIAN.)—At the time of closing the mails we are glad to learn that Deacons Scott and Robertson who were both seriously ill with gripe are slightly better. Mr. and Mrs. Alex McInnis of Red Point are both very sick with the same prevalent disease. Their son Mr. James S. McInnis of Bear River is visiting his parents. His many friends are glad to see him hale and hearty, and are pleased to know that his matrimonial voyage has been successful and encouraging.

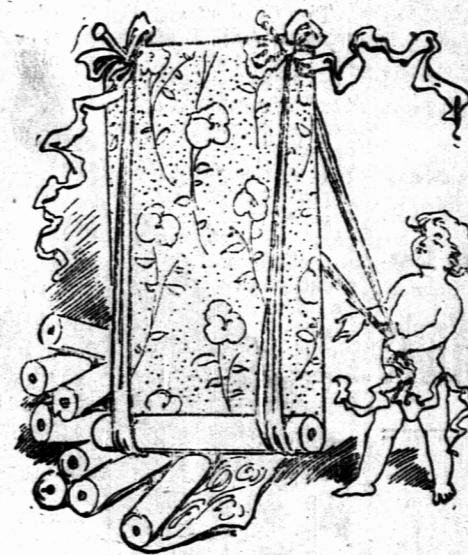
