### LADY SOMERS PASSES COLUMBUS' BIG GOAL

Modern Ship to Skirt Watling Island on 439th Anniversary. Replica of Santa Maria to Make Second "Discovery" of America

MONTREAL, Oct. 10.—Canadians aboard the Canadian National liner, Lady Somers bound for Montreal, will pass close to the Island of San Salvador, sometimes called Watling Island, within a few hours of the celebration there of the 439th anniversary of the discovery of America. Columbus sighted the Island and landed there on Oct. 12th, 1492, after the epic voyage from Spain, and during which mutiny almost brought disaster to his enterprise. It was his first sight of the New World.

San Salvador is one of the several hundreds of islands known as the Bahamas, a part of the British West Indies. Columbus found it peopled with lazy, unfriendly savages whom he called Lucayans. We hear that from Madrid comes the news that this winter 25 Spaniards will set sail from Spain in an exact replica of Columbus's ship, the Santa Maria. Equipped with only the instruments and comforts of Columbus' time, the Santa Maria 2nd will repeat the voyage of Columbus.

The Santa Maria 2nd will probably visit Canadian ports in the spring and may even pass up the world's greatest inland water way, the St. Lawrence and Great Lakes system, to Port Arthur, 2,000 miles inland. What would Christopher Columbus say? His likeness in marble, looks down on the sea at Nassau, not far from San Salvador.

### PENNSYLVANIA'S OLDEST TWINS OBSERVE BIRTHDAY

ALLENTOWN, Pa., Oct. 9 (U.P.)—The Helfner twins, Peter and Mary, celebrated their 89 birthday anniversary here. They claim to be the oldest living twins in Pennsylvania. Only known rivals, according to reports are the Benner twins at Quarryville, who are 83 and the Hess brothers at Lancaster, 72.

### ROAD CONNECTS BRAZIL RESORTS

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil, Oct. 9 (U.P.)—Two of Brazil's most important summer resorts, Novo Friburgo and Theropoles, are now connected by a paved highway, inauguration of which took place in the mountains to the west of Rio. "It was a feat of organization which was remarkable for its efficiency and excellence," said Mr. J. Champan, who accompanied the party as the railway's representative throughout the tour and S. M. Greene, whose assistance began when the delegates arrived in New York.
