There was a good market yesterday; geese sold at one twenty-five and one fifty each, turkeys at sixteen to fifteen per lb., pork at seven and a half to seven and three quarters per lb., loose straw at thirty cents and loose hay at forty to forty-eight, pressed straw at five fifty and pressed hay at eight fifty, black oats at forty and white at thirty-eight, eggs at thirty, butter twenty-five to twenty-six, ducks and chickens at seventy-five cents to one dollar per pair.

Mr. Chownen in a few well chosen words expressed his surprise and gratitude for the kindly remembrance made, and the exercises of the evening were brought to a close by singing the National Anthem.
