ON Tuesday evening, May 21st, the League of the Cross Minstrels will appear in the Opera House and give one of their splendid entertainments. There will also be a parade in connection at 12 o'clock the same morning.

UNDER the heading of shipping news the Record of the 15th says: Steamer Polino cleared for Quebec from North Sydney to-day with a cargo of coal. Steamer Bonavista arrived at North Sydney this morning. Schooner Annie M., cleared from North Sydney to-day for Charlottetown.

DR. Stephenson of Toronto, who has charge of the Young People's Forward Movement for Missions, will address a meeting in the Methodist Church, Tryon, on Tuesday, 21st inst, Bedeque, 22nd inst. and on Thursday, 23rd, a convention of Epworth League and Young People's Societies of the District will be held at Summerside.

DR. F. C. Stephenson of the Methodist Mission Rooms, Toronto, is in the city and will preach in the First Methodist Church, to-morrow evening, and will address a missionary convention, Monday afternoon and evening in the same church. Dr. Stephenson, will preach in the Cornwall Methodist Church to-morrow morning.

At an adjourned meeting of the quarterly official board of the Methodist church held last week Rev. W. J. Kirby declined the invitation tendered him to return as pastor of the Milltown circuit for a third year, on account of his purpose to devote himself to evangelistic work among children and young people during the next conference year.—Wesleyan.

A DESPATCH from Mabou states that several cargoes of oats and potatoes from P. E. Island have been sold there, "all realizing good prices." This seems odder than carrying coals to Newcastle. We have hitherto regarded Inverness County as the most progressive agricultural district in the province, yet the farmers of its island neighbor, despite freight rates and other disadvantages, undersell those of Inverness in the latter's market. Our farmers have need of cultivating better business habits.—Sydney Record.

THE Prince Edward Island Telephone Company intend installing during the coming summer what is known as the McLure system. Instead of the ground circuit system as at present a large copper wire strung on the posts will be connected with the telephones, thus avoiding the buzz of the electric light system and the annoyance experienced in that regard will be obviated. It is expected that the new system will be in vogue before the long evenings of the fall are upon us.

THE P. E. Island Telephone Company are extending their lines to the North Shore. Tourists and citizens who summer at Acadia Hotel, the Mutch House or the Cliff House will find the telephone system almost invaluable in doing away with the apparent isolation experienced in former years. The residences of Col. Orr, and Alex. McDonald, Esq., will also be connected. The line will follow St. Peter's Road until Little York is reached, thence north to the points before mentioned.
