TWO VICIOUS NAZI STABS AT ANZIO DEFEATED

Enemy Falls To Make One Yard Advance

WASHINGTON, March 10—(AP)—Two vicious German attacks at American positions southeast of Anzio on the beachhead were repulsed at dawn Thursday, leaving no-man's-land so cluttered with enemy dead and wounded that German details required several hours to remove them under a Red Cross flag of truce.

War Situation Last Night

A general German retreat behind the Bug River line or into Rumania on the Black Sea flank of the eastern front may be indicated by surrender of Uman, the fall of which was first announced by Berlin, and confirmed in a Stalin victory bulletin from Moscow.

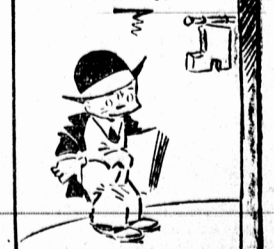
