NEANDERTHAL MAN STIRS THE LEARNED

LONDON, May 31.—It appears from a discovery in a cave among the cliffs of St. Brelades Bay, on the south coast of Jersey, that there was a German invasion of England even before Adam's time. Some English scientists have unearthed there a specimen of the Neanderthal man, whose habit in the days before imperial preference came to trouble us was in the valley of Elberfeld. The Neanderthal man, who, according to scientists, was a "low brow," was a bit of a traveller in his time. He has been found in France, Belgium, Germany, Austria and in parts of Asia, but it was not believed until his discovery in Jersey that he had attempted to invade England. Even now loyal British explorers decline to admit that he came to England, but hold that when he arrived in Jersey that little island was a bit of what is now in France. His teeth, nine in number, have been examined by Professor Keith, of the Royal College of Surgeons, who says that they belong without doubt to an individual of the Neanderthal race, but are in certain features more primitive than even the teeth of the Heidelberg mandible, usually regarded as the earliest remains of man discovered in Europe, and assigned to the glacial period. Apparently Neanderthal men, though they did not possess automobiles, had some rare sport, as buried with the man found in Jersey were specimens of the woolly rhinoceros, fleet reindeer and two varieties of horse.

A BISHOP'S ILLNESS

OTTAWA, June 3.—Monsieur Gauthier, Archbishop of Ottawa, has gone to Mount Clemens, Mich., on a two weeks' trip for his health. He is suffering from neuritis of the right arm, the disease being aggravated, it is thought, by his participation in an unusual number of confirmation ceremonies, which necessitated the taping of thousands of children on the cheek, since he came here from Kingston.

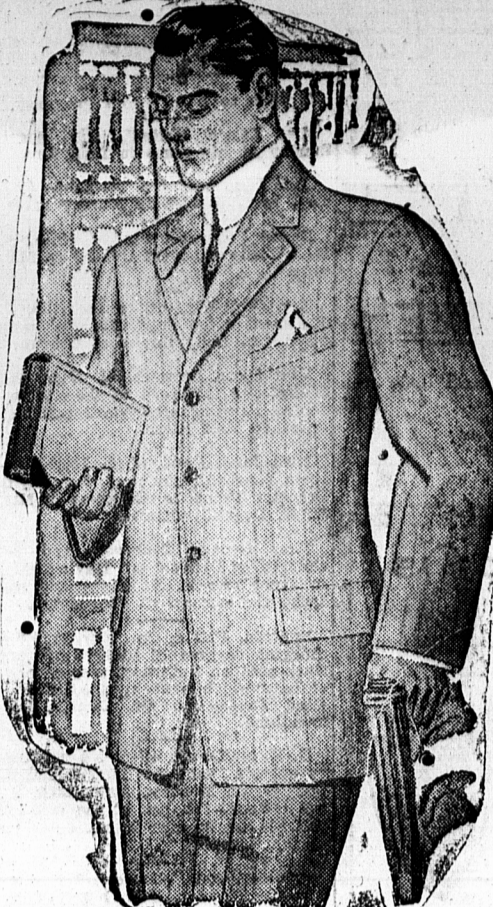

EPIDEMIC OF TONSILLITIS IN GREATER BOSTON

BOSTON, June 2.—The germ which is causing the present epidemic of the so-called tonsillitis in Greater Boston is one of the most virulent which physicians of Greater Boston have had any experience with. Within a few days one well known pathologist of Harvard Medical school has been in danger of life, and another died Wednesday. The latter was Dr. Emma W. Mooers, curator of the Seuro Pathological Department at Harvard Medical School. The former, Dr. Elmer Southard, is the professor in the same department at the Medical School. He has been at the Massachusetts General Hospital for several days but is now believed to be out of danger. Both Dr. Mooers and Dr. Southard became infected with the streptococci—the germs of tonsillitis—through abrasions on their hands while performing a post mortem on the brain of a man who had died from the effects of tonsillitis.

OCTOBER 1 THE DATE SET

MEXICO CITY, June 3.—By official decree issued by Provisional President Delaharra, a special presidential election is called. In all states and territories, electors will be chosen on October 1, and these will select the successor of Porfirio Diaz on Sunday Oct. 7. In small towns and rural regions there doubtless are thousands to whom the word "Election" conveys little or no meaning. At present, Francisco Madero, Jr., is the only man whose name is certain to be on the ballot, Gen. Bernardo Reyes will be in the capital in a few days. His coming makes some of the Maderists nervous. That any effort will be made to prevent General Reyes from reaching the capital is not expected, but stories of plots both in his favor and against him are heard daily. Yesterday afternoon a newspaper published a story that a group of army officers had planned to proclaim him president and use their forces to place him at the head of the nation.
