Kelly-McInnis Marathon Postponed To Sept. 11th

Jimmy Hennigan Forced To Withdraw Entry — New Date Assures Larger Entry List.

The Kelly & McInnis annual ten-mile road race has been postponed from Labor Day until Monday, Sept. 11th.
This step was taken because of the last minute withdrawal of Jimmy Hennigan, Boston. Jimmy wired to say that the New England athletic officials would not grant him permission to compete on the Island because seven cities in and around Boston were sponsoring races on or after Labor Day. A second reason for the change of date was to allow Noel Paul to run in Sydney in the 26-mile race on the holiday.
The local race has lured a fine group of plodders into the spotlight. Besides Roy Oliver, the Maritime champ, Noel Paul and John Paul, of Springhill are to participate, and possibly Elias McLellan, of Noel, Nova Scotia, who represented Canada in the Olympics in 1928.
Endurance men from the Island primed for the test are: Wallace Rodd and his younger brother, Hughie Campbell, of Graham's Road, McEwen and Blackstone, of Lot 40, Roper of Highfield. Other provincial athletes are training, but their names have not yet been received. The complete roll will number fifteen.

Nelson Sets New Mark For 15 Mile Marathon Swim

Fort Dodge Entry Winning Race For Second Time Clips Over 19 Minutes From Old Record — Young Forced Out.

TORONTO, Aug. 30. — (C.P.) — Swimming history was written in the blue-green waters of Lake Ontario tonight when Marvin Nelson, confident Fort Dodge, Ia., youngster crossed the finishing line in the Canadian National Exhibition's 15-mile marathon just seven hours, 37 2-5 seconds after he had plunged from the starting barges. Nelson's phenomenal performance gives him the world's professional title for the distance, and \$5,000 in cash from the Canadian National Exhibition. He clipped more than 19 minutes from the world's record time set by George Blagden, of Memphis, Tenn., and accomplished something no other man has ever done in winning the marathon twice. Nelson won the event in 1930 but took 22 minutes longer to cover the distance.

GOLF QUEENS LEAD MARCH OF FAVOURITES

Great Britain and United States Stars Shatter Par By Three Strokes in Hunt For Women's Golf Title.

EXMOOR CLUB, Highland Park, Ill., Aug. 30—Blazing the trail with prize shots that vanquished their foes and par by decisive margins, the golfing queens of Great Britain and the United States, Enid Wilson and Virginia Van Wie, led a victory march of the favorites in to the quarter finals of the United States women's championship today at Exmoor.
The English girl, out to place the American trophy alongside the three British crowns she has won in succession, and the American champion, both shattered par by three strokes.
Miss Wilson disposed of Mrs. Harley Highbie of Detroit, 4 and 3, while Miss Van Wie, decorating her card with two eagles, defeated Mrs. Leo Federman of New York, 4 and 3.
Together with the champions of the leading golf nations, a pair of rising stars, Charlotte Glutting of West Orange, N. J., and Lucille Robinson of Des Moines, and four of America's most prominent contenders emerged victorious.
The four were Mrs. Leona Cheney, San Gabriel, Cal., 1929 finalist; Maureen Orcutt of Haworth, N. J., finalist in 1927; Mrs. Opal S. Hill of Kansas City, three times western champion, and Helen Hicks, 1931 titleholder from New York.
Eagles and birdies appeared on several cards today as ideal weather provided perfect scoring conditions over the rolling terrain, but Miss Wilson shot the best golf. Out in 36, three under par, as she whaled into the ball for average tee shots of better than 200 yards and iron shots that split the pin, the tall blonde English champion led from start to finish.
