UNSELFISHNESS NOT SALVATION.

Mere unselfishness, in this Christian age and land, saves no one. To pour out our lives for others is not the way of salvation. Altruism is not our passport to Heaven. It may startle some of us to hear this. Probably many believe that Jesus taught that "whosoever shall lose his life shall save it." But he did not. If that had been so, no Saviour would have been needed. We could all have saved ourselves by spending our lives in the service of others. per on the Summer School. By so doing it might be the means of causing more of our Island teachers to attend the School as here were only three or four in attendance last year out of something near three hundred professors and scholars from the Atlantic Provinces.

The writer of this thesis has attended three sessions of the School and the sentiments which she has so ably and eloquently expressed regarding the usefulness and the work done in the School are the sentiments of all those who have had the privilege of attending.

In order to stimulate the cause of education in this Province our Local Government ought to pay the expenses of all teachers from the Island for one term, which would be from \$30.00 to \$35.00 per teacher, who would attend and after that for every term or session that a teacher had attended, to give a bonus of say \$30.00 to his or her salary, to the number of four terms, so that a teacher having attended say four terms clear of the first term of which the Government had paid the expenses, he or she would receive a bonus of \$30.00 besides his yearly salary and this money would be money well invested.

Last year the Government paid the direct benefit of the teachers studies to the Military College, Halifax. Is there not a strong or stronger reason that the Government should pay the expenses of the students to the Summer School as the Province gets the direct benefit of the teachers studies besides teachers from the smallness of their salaries are not able to bear the expense themselves? Our Federal Government is doing something handsome in the matter of the Navy. Is there not as good a reason that our Local Government do something

handsome in the matter of education in this Province? No doubt, Mr. Editor, that you and the other editors of the Island press will put in your oars to good effect in this important matter.

JUDGE EMMERSON DEAD

MONCTON, Jan. 6.—Fred W. Emerson, Judge of Probate, died at 1.30 this morning after a six-weeks illness. He was high Secretary of the New Brunswick Independent Foresters for 25 years, also prominent in the Masonic fraternity. He was a graduate of the U. N. B., and the Boston Law School. He had been probate judge for 18 years, an active member of the First Baptist Church here, and a governor of Acadia University. He was 57 years old and is survived by a wife, four sons and three daughters. He was a brother of Hon. H. R. Emmerson, M. P. and of Mrs. Harvey Atkinson of Ottawa.

FRASER RIVER NOT FROZEN

Edmonton, Jan. 3.—Men coming up from far down the Fraser say provisions are becoming so scarce that some of the camps have already reduced their forces. The trouble is that the Fraser has not yet frozen this season and consequently there is no freighting down the river on the ice. All the contractors were confidently expecting to do their winter freighting in this manner, and in the face of the present situation are bitterly disappointed.

Experienced trappers who have been in this region for years say that the season is so far advanced that the river will not freeze up at all this winter. If this proves true Grand Trunk Pacific constructors will have their winter's work considerably curtailed.
