God Save the King.

THE party sent to repair the Minto's propeller, by the Board of Trade, including diver and assistants reached Murray Harbor early yesterday morning and found that the steamers were then nearer Cape Bear. They drove to that place and embarked shortly before 1 p.m. in three dories, the steamers being then six miles south of the Cape and apparently about a mile apart. Both steamers then had steam up. The party expected to reach the steamers about 6 p.m. Mr. Lord received a telegram from Messrs. Dodd & Dwyer, agents of the Department at Picton, stating that orders had been received from Ottawa to use explosives to free the steamers; that the ammunition was being arranged for in Halifax and a tug being got ready at Picton to take it to the scene of action. The services of a diver from Halifax were offered for \$25 a day and expenses. Premier Peters and President Messervey also had a proposal from J. J. Yonston of Picton to supply a diver at any time for four dollars a day from time of starting, two dollars per hour while working, and ten dollars a day for use of the diving apparatus. From this it will be seen that another diver can be had if needed.

The preamble to the resolution sets out that business in Prince Edward Island has been very seriously retarded by the ice blockade, which it is believed might be overcome by the use of a larger and stronger ice-breaking ship. The resolution adopted is as follows: Therefore Resolved that the Minister of Marine and Fisheries be asked to investigate the situation and, if possible to decide on such improvements as will meet the needs of the people affected.
