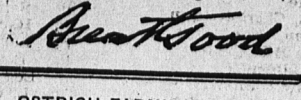

OSTRICH FARMING DEAD.

Ostrich farming in South Africa has been given such a blow by the war and the fickle fancy of fashion that even the desperate expedient of a world-wide "Ostrich Feather day" is not considered as a means of relief. Ostrich leather exports from South Africa were valued at \$25,000,000 annually in times of prosperity and the raising of birds monopolized the attention of the land-owners to such an extent that ordinary farming was neglected and now, while general purpose farming has had no opportunity to assert itself, the birds are of so little productive value that thousands are stated in consular reports to be dying from lack of food and attention while other thousands roam the roads and veldt, uncared for and unworked. Reception is even refused them in the village pounds.

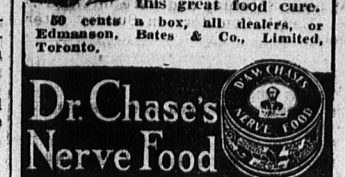

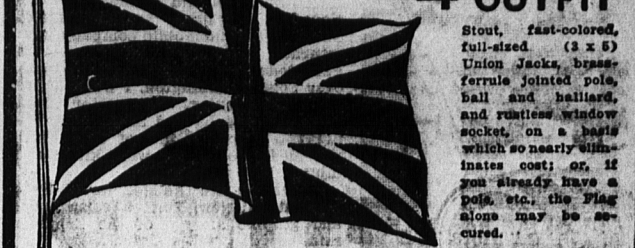
