Gov. Of Caracas Assassinated

Gen. Matayillas Killed By Partizans of First Vice President Gomez - Assassins in Cafe - Crowd Opened Fire on Them With Their Revolvers

CARACAS, Feb. 3.-General Luis Matayillas, the Governor of Caracas was assassinated last night by a crowd of intoxicated partizans of Vincente Gomez, the first Vice President of the Republic.

Immediately after the shooting the assassins drove hurriedly to the outskirts of the city and took refuge in the mountains. Today troops were sent out to pursue them. Another incident of last night was a fight between General Salas, Commander of San Maurizio barracks and Ovello Uzcategui, Commander of the troops in the Federal district.

ROOSEVELT ASSAILED THE BIG FINANCIERS

Shaking His Finger At Morgan and Rogers, He Tells Them To Prepare For Mob Violence - Sensational Incident At Club Banquet - President Attacks Fellow Guests.

NEW YORK, Feb. 2.-Financial circles heard with astonishment to-day the statement that President Roosevelt had made an attack on the money of Wall Street at the dinner of the Gridiron Club in Washington last Saturday night.

Senator Foraker is said to have been the cause of this outbreak from the president. He is quoted as having said that the attack of the government officers upon corporations, and especially railroads, was having an unsettling and detrimental effect.

Those who have talked of the affair stated that he stood up and, shaking his fingers in the direction of Senator Foraker and of Mr. Morgan and Mr. Rogers, said: "If your gentlemen are not willing to accept the action of the conservative class which is ready to afford protection alike to the rich and the poor I will say to you now that when you have disposed of us by your machinations you will find yourselves face to face with a people which believes it has been deprived of its rights and a mob which does not have the least respect for riches. You can take your choice."

What Fishermen Have To Endure

Terrible Hardship Of Captain Thomas Nickerson and His Crew - They Left Their Ship And Suffered Greatly.

SYDNEY, February 1.-The extreme hardships, indeed privations, endured by frozen herring fishermen in the Bay of Islands is only in part known. The story told by Captain Thomas Nickerson, owner of the Gloucester schooner Elizabeth N. Nicholson, which was driven ashore several days ago at Larks Harbor, is one of harrowing details.

Captain Nickerson and eleven fishermen, who came with him tell a tale of suffering since leaving their vessels in the ice. From Larks Harbor the men were obliged to walk twenty-two miles to Bireby Cove, part of the journey in the face of a furious and blinding snowstorm, over cliffs and hills covered with ice and snow. Both Captain Nickerson and Cook Thomas Edwards, of the Elizabeth N., had a narrow escape from death. While walking on the ice it gave way, precipitating Edwards in to the water. A life chain was formed by the men and with great difficulty Cook was saved. No sooner was he rescued than Captain Nickerson went through and for the second time the benighted fishermen were obliged to lie on the ice and form a life chain.

FRENCH CABINET IN SOME DANGER

Clemenceau and Education Minister Briand Disagree on Proposition of Bishops.

PARIS, Feb. 2.-The existence of the cabinet is believed to be in danger as a result of the clash in the Chamber of Deputies last night between Premier Clemenceau and Education Minister Briand, resulting from a radical divergence of views regarding the modus vivendi proposition of the French bishops.

Mr. Briand regards the proposition as being unacceptable in its present form, but believes that the war with the church has gone far enough, and that the door of conciliation should not be closed.

ELECTIONS IN RUSSIA ARE OVER

Peasants in Russian Poland Generally are Electing Nationalist Representatives

ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 2.-The primary elections for members to the lower house of Parliament, by the smaller land owners, came to an end today in thirty-eight provinces, comprising one-half of the total electorate in Russia. According to administrative figures the elections are divided approximately as follows: Conservative Monarchists, 35 per cent; Moderate Progressives, 41 per cent; and Constitutional Democrats and other extremists, 24 per cent.

MINISTER HAD THIRTEEN WIVES

But He Had To Give Up at the Unlucky Number

CHICAGO, Feb. 2.-A despatch from Toledo, Ohio, says: "Charged with bigamy and credited with having thirteen wives, Rev. Albert Holden, reported to have two sons also under indictment for bigamy, pleaded guilty yesterday and was sentenced to serve six years in the penitentiary. Holden says he married every time the spirit moved him. His courtship always took place during one of his revivals and his wives were always one of those whom he had taken into the church. Just before sentence was passed, Holden said to the judge that he had been the victim of brain trouble and blamed his many marriages on this affliction. He said that he had struggled against the sin of bigamy, but that all his prayers had availed him nothing."

QUEBEC REVOKES TRAVELLERS' TAX

But Taxes on Railways and Large Corporations Will Go Up.

QUEBEC, Feb. 2.-Hon. Mr. Tessier, the new treasurer of the province made his first budget speech today showing that the receipts and expenditures had been as follows: Ordinary receipts, \$5,310,100. Ordinary expenditures, \$5,013,417. Excess of ordinary receipts, \$296,740. The extraordinary expenditures paid out of ordinary revenue had been \$167,300. Thus the excess of the ordinary receipts over both ordinary and extraordinary expenditure had been \$129,440. His predecessor had properly included in the ordinary receipts the amounts derived from the sales of timber limits. Nevertheless he had found that by deducting from the ordinary receipts the proceeds of the sales effected during the year there would still remain an excess of \$74,244 ordinary receipts over ordinary expenditure.

FIREBUGS BUSY IN TORONTO

Many Mysterious Fires in Downtown Districts - Investigation Going on.

TORONTO, Feb. 2.-Fires of mysterious origin have occurred in office buildings here lately and it is evident firebugs are operating in the downtown district. At the premises of Calvert & Dwyer Co., Ltd., dealers in wool, Wellington West, yesterday, attempts were made by an unknown person to set fire to the building in four different places at the same time. The Star building on King street west was the scene of two earlier fires under similar circumstances, and about 1 o'clock fire was discovered in the vault of W. D. McPherson's law office. The damage in all cases was slight.

DELIGHTED WITH AMERICAN WAY

English Teacher Tells Her Impression of School On This Side

LONDON, Feb. 2.-The methods in girls' schools was the special subject which Miss Peles, of the English Board Schools in Bermuda, investigated on her recent tour in America.

The point which impressed this extremely intelligent woman most was one which I think must be very patent to all who have any knowledge of the methods of American education, namely that they do not trouble so much about results as we do, but that Americans aim at training the imagination and the observation to a far greater extent than anything we find here, and endeavor to give a free play to creative faculty rather than to bind scholars to pass fixed examinations.

DAVIS REPORTS TO NAVY DEPT

Admiral Evans Commends Admiral Davis for Conduct in Dealing With Situation

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2.-The President yesterday in unequivocal terms gave his approval of Admiral Davis' entire action in connection with his visit to Kingston, Jamaica, to render aid to the stricken city, and in addition, requested the Secretary of the Navy to express to Admiral Davis his heartfelt commendation for all that he did.

The long expected report of Admiral Davis of the circumstances leading up to the withdrawal of his squadron from Kingston, reached the Navy Department today and was at once laid before the President. In as much as the president already has announced that the diplomatic phase of the case is a closed incident the report itself will not be made public but later today, Secretary Messers, gave out the letter of Admiral Evans Commander-in-chief of the Atlantic fleet warmly commending Admiral Davis for his conduct of a situation "which was to say the least somewhat embarrassing."

THE MALBOROS HAVE MADE UP

An Authoritative Statement About the Settlement of Their Troubles

LONDON, Feb. 2.-An authoritative statement embodying what the family desires to say on the case of the Duke and Duchess of Marlborough was given out yesterday. It is as follows: "The difference between the Duke and the Duchess of Marlborough have been settled privately. The children will arrive at Southern House today and the Duchess and her children will proceed to the continent early next week."

This statement is somewhat ambiguous owing to the possible interpretation that the Duke and Duchess have settled their difference and resumed the relations of husband and wife, but the family express desire to let it stand as it is without giving it further preciseness.

FIVE YEARS IN PENITENTIARY

Charles McGill Sentenced - Pleading Guilty To Making and Signing False Returns

TORONTO, Feb. 2.-For making and signing false returns Charles McGill, ex-manager of the Ontario Bank, was sentenced to five years in the penitentiary. Justice Clute said he had noticed in some newspapers the statement that some arrangement had been made whereby McGill pleaded guilty to some charges, it would lead to the mitigation of his sentence. "There is no arrangement of that character, and I think I know. This sentence has nothing to do with any other charges that may have been made."

RETICENT AS TO SWETTENHAM

State Department at Washington is Not Giving Out Information

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.-Officials at the State Department refuse to discuss the report that Gov. Swettenham has withdrawn his letter to Admiral Davis and apologized for it. It is pointed out that the President has taken every means known to him to make it evident that he regards the Kingston episode as a closed incident, so that officials decline to comment on it in any phase at this time.

Secretary Taft has received the following cablegram from Gov. Swettenham: "Most grateful thanks for supply of tents just arrived from Cuba in charge of Capt. Battle, United States Army. Service most highly appreciated." The tents referred to are those forwarded from Santiago by Gen. Wint upon the urgent request made to Gov. Magoon by the acting British Minister at Havana.

JURY PICKED TO TRY H. K. THAW

Has Taken Eight Days To Get Them - Insanity Will Be The Defence

NEW YORK, February 2.-The Thaw jury was completed late yesterday. The selection of the twelfth juror came as a complete surprise at the end of a long and tedious day, the eighth of the trial, and immediately after this last number of the trial panel had been sworn in, Justice Eltinger ordered an adjournment of court until 10.30 o'clock Monday morning.

From the questions which have persistently been put to the salesman by Thaw's attorneys as to any prejudice against a defense of insanity, it is at last generally conceded that a plea of emotional madness will be the main reliance of the young defendant. This probably will lead to a cross-questioning of the state's witnesses, as to any peculiarity they may have noticed in Thaw's conduct the night of the tragedy, in which event the conclusion of the state's direct testimony may take longer than is now anticipated.

KING AND QUEEN TO VISIT PARIS

British Rulers to Make a Purely Visit To French Capital

LONDON, Feb. 2.-King Edward and Queen Alexandra are to spend a week in Paris before the opening of parliament. Their Majesties start February 2 returning probably February 9. The trip is described officially as purely personal and private. It is, however, recalled that the previous visits of King Edward to Paris have been followed by the strengthening of the Anglo-French understanding and the general impression is that the present visit will assist in the extension of the understanding, which some observers believe ultimately result in an Anglo-French military convention.

IRISH BURLESQUE CAUSE A RIOT

Is Howled Down By Irishmen Who Tesseded the Play

NEW YORK, Feb. 2.-Twenty-two arrests were made tonight at the Orpheum Theatre, in Brooklyn, at the result of a riot which broke out during the performance by the Russell Brothers of a play called the Irish Servant Girl.

A number of Irishmen who resented the alleged anti-Irish tone of the play, began to pelt the performers with eggs, but were with some difficulty hustled out of the theatre by the police. No one was seriously injured in the disturbance.

BAD STATE OF VIRGINIA MINE

Mutilated Bodies Numerous And the Shaft is Full of Deadly Fumes.

CHARLESTON, W. Va., Feb. 2.-The bodies of the nine victims of Tuesday's explosion were brought to the surface today. Seven were identified. The rescuers found mutilated bodies so numerous in the shaft that it was impossible to move about without stepping upon them. The shaft is in a terrible state. The timbers have been loosened by the explosion and great icicles have formed while icy springs pour water into the shaft. The shaft is also full of deadly fumes.
