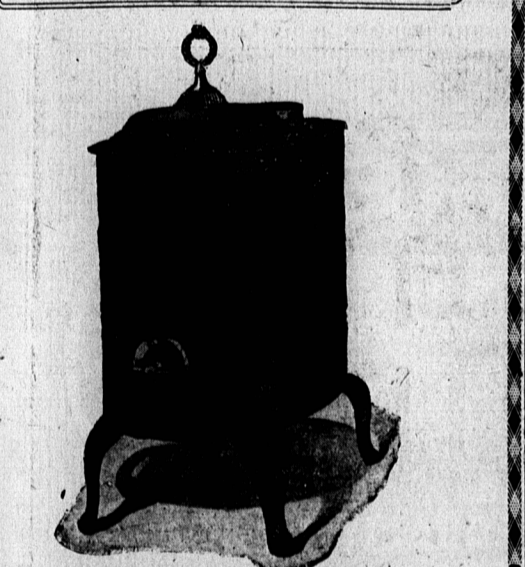

CHICAGO TO HAVE DERBY COURSE

CHICAGO, Oct. 18.—Officials of the Illinois Jockey Club, which has sponsored the two weeks racing at Hawthorne track just closed, announced that a new race track embodying the only Derby course in the new world will be built here immediately with a view to renewing the American Derby beginning next year. Club officials said they planned to hold the Derby the third Saturday in June of each year with stakes of \$100,000 added and expected to continue the racing for 25 days.
