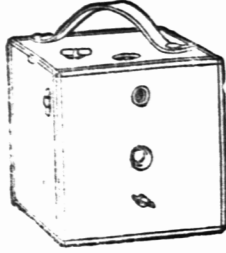

SURROUNDED by surviving members of the family, the remains of Mrs. L. Baker were laid to rest in the Kingsley Cemetery last Saturday. Funeral services were held at the house, Rev. C. L. Richards of Baraboo, delivering the last tribute to the memory of the departed. Mrs. Baker was born in North Bedouque, Prince Edward Island, Nov. 28, 1826. She was married to W. J. Taylor in 1844. J. R. Taylor of Minneapolis, and T. L. Taylor of Dakota, were present at the funeral. H. J. Taylor, the third son, is at present in the Klondike. After Mr. Taylor's death, which occurred in 1850, the family removed to Maine. In 1854 Mrs. Taylor was married to Louis Baker with whom she came to Wisconsin in 1855. They settled in Waukegan soon after, where they have lived continually since. Five children were born to them one daughter dying at the age of five years and the death of the youngest daughter Mrs. W. A. Rudd occurred at Minneapolis about six months ago. The remaining children, Mrs. E. B. Park of Cleveland, Dr. L. R. Baker of Hammond Ind. and L. W. Baker of this place were all present through their mother's last hours. During a long and busy life Mrs. Baker had gained the respect and affection of all who knew her. Her straight forward, honest high principles and noble generosity were known to all. In her husband she found a wise counsellor and a valuable helpmeet. She was a devoted mother, and was charitable and kind-hearted, always ready to aid those in need and well disposed to all. By her death the community loses a noble woman whose memory will always be revered. Besides those mentioned there were present at the funeral W. A. Rudd, and his son, Capt. Jay, lately home from the Philippines and Leon, of St. Paul, and Mrs. Joseph Keyes, of Chicago.—Waukegan News, July 20, 1899. (The deceased was a sister of M. P. Baker, of this town.)
