TO ALL CANADIANS

Handling U.S. Currency In The Course of Business

Many goods and services securable only in the United States are essential to the maintenance of Canadian industry and the high level of employment. All the U.S. dollars spent in Canada by U.S. tourists and business visitors are needed for these essential purchases. To ensure that these tourist dollars are made available for this purpose, the Foreign Exchange Control regulations require that merchants, hotel keepers, service stations and all others must turn in whatever U.S. currency they receive to their banks.

F.E.C.B. Regulations You Should Know

1. You may accept U.S. currency from anyone who tenders it, either in payment for purchases or for exchange into Canadian currency at par.
2. You may make change in U.S. currency for a non-resident tourist who has tendered U.S. currency in payment of purchases.
3. You must NOT pay out U.S. currency to anyone in exchange for Canadian currency.
4. You must not pay out U.S. currency in change to a Canadian resident, even though the latter has tendered U.S. currency in payment of a purchase.
