MOVING THE WHEAT CROP.

Manitoba produced this year about 85 million bushels of wheat. At least half this quantity ought to be placed at Fort William, the head of our water transportation, during the open season of navigation in the fall. The Winnipeg Free Press says that from the best information it can gather the wheat bought from the farmers and paid for at Fort William prices, less the railway freight is less than 30 per cent of the crop. The balance must either be stored by the farmers, whose facilities are very inadequate, or sold at prices that will permit its being stored at the elevators until spring. When bought by the elevator combine for storage in this way brings the farmer eight, or nine cents less per bushel than that which went through to Fort William for fall shipment.

This is a very serious loss to the farmer. A loss of eight and a half cents per bushel means a loss of \$85,000 on each million bushels, and if only ten million bushels are thus needlessly delayed, and sold by the farmer at such loss, the loss would be \$350,000. Naturally the prairie farmers are restive under such conditions. They blame the railways, which appear to be doing their best, but were not prepared to handle so vast a crop. Both the C. P. R., and the Canadian Northern have increased their locomotives and cars but the elevator capacity at Fort William is not sufficient to take care of the grain as fast as it was brought thither. One

of the large C. P. R. elevators at that port was burned last spring, and the new one to take its place is not yet completed. Another large elevator for the same railway is also yet incomplete.

The railways claim to be doing their best, and charge that the combination which controls a large share of the many local elevators in the grain-growing districts are not paying the farmers a fair price for their grain. The elevator men in turn claim that they are paying all they can afford to pay for grain which must be stored for months before it can be moved and which must take the chance of what the market price may be next spring at Fort William. We are left to conclude that the heavy loss to the prairie farmers from want of adequate transportation facilities is a loss absolute, without counter-vailing gain to any body. By next harvest no doubt conditions will be much improved, but it is still to be feared that increased transport facilities may not keep pace with the enlargement of the harvest. Present conditions are concisely defined by Sir William Vanhorne in the phrase, "Manitoba's hopper is too large for the spout."
